

With the arrival of the town report imminent, the selectboard encourages Tunbridgians to read the individual reports and study the proposed budgets. Not only will all those eyes on all those numbers root out mistakes, but the subsequent discussions at Town Meeting will be informed and substantive.

Reportedly, Eskimos have something like 50 different words for snow. One wonders if “snotballs” is one of them—an expression used by Road Crew chief, Rodney Hoyt, to describe what the Road Crew had to deal with one day. While January proved to be unusually warm, scarcely a day went by without some form of precipitation—or often three or four forms of precipitation within 24 hours. This year, 2017, could be dubbed, “The year of the Town Hall.” Our venerable hub is going to be the center of much-needed attention over the next 12 months. First, at the beginning of the winter, a new furnace was installed to replace the drooping old one that was threatening to die at a time

Once again, the Board of Auditors have been working a lot of hours, gathering information for the Town Report. This involves obtaining reports, budgets, orders, auditing of same, and putting the information together for the printing of the town report. This is a time consuming process and we are very grateful to everyone who contributed to those efforts, including the town clerk and administrative assistant, town treasurer, and representatives from outside organizations. The auditors greatly appreciate those who sent their reports on time, however, many reports were submitted late. This creates a burden getting the town report to the printer in a timely manner. By law, the town report, if mailed, must be received not less than ten days prior to Town Meeting. However, it is the auditors and town clerks hope that the townspeople receive the report at least one week prior to pre-town meeting, which is the end of February. Having said that, the auditors double efforts to obtain and input all reports by published deadlines. We are looking forward to town meeting.

You will note an article on the warning in the Town Report, which concerns the mailing of the town report. If the article is approved, this will result in a cost savings to the town. Tunbridge residents and voters will continue to receive the town report by mail, however, all property owners outside of Vermont zip code will receive a postcard advising them of the availability of the town report.

We will be looking for an auditor to replace Luke Jandreau, who is moving out of town and unable to continue in this position. His term expires 2019, therefore this would be a two-year position to fill. If you are interested or know of someone who may be, contact Betsy or Maxine at the above email.

RABIES CLINIC will be held on March 25, 2017, 9:00am -12 Noon at the Chelsea Town Hall. This clinic will be combined with Chelsea; the cost of the Vaccine is \$15.00. Vaccine and inoculations are provided by a licensed Veterinarian from the Chelsea Animal Hospital, Chelsea VT, (802) 685-3232. This Clinic is for Dogs and Cats; Dogs must be leashed; Cats must be in a carrier.

Deadline for Licensing is April 1, 2017. If your dog(s) is/are due for a rabies vaccine prior to April 1, a license cannot be issued until an updated rabies certificate has been received by the Clerk. Cost per license is \$9.00 spayed/neutered; \$13.00 for non-spayed/neutered. You may get dog licenses at the Town Clerks Office, or by mail. I will also be available at the rabies clinic to issue dog licenses. Please call the office if you have any questions.

Happy New Year!!! I hope that everyone enjoyed a wonderful holiday season. In November I was busy finishing up with taxes and missed the deadline for the November TQ, so I thought I would give you a breakdown of how our tax season went. We needed to raise \$3,376,977.91 of which the state paid \$480,230.36, and the Town was responsible for funding \$2,896,747.55. Of that \$2,896,747.55 the town raised \$2,742,740.19, which means that 154,007.36 is delinquent. This delinquent number may change a little due to changes in current use, late homestead filings, notifications from the state, etc. that necessitate a revised bill from the town. The amount that went delinquent is slightly lower this year than last year.

I want to remind everyone to make sure they file their Vermont Homestead declarations and Property Tax adjustment forms with their income taxes. If you have someone else file for you, always double check that they are filing these forms, especially if it is with a company outside of VT. This will save you from having to pay penalties later if you're filing late..

I also want to remind everyone that you can pay your taxes for 2017 early if you want to spread the payments out over the year. All you have to do is send me a check with a note that the payment is for 2017 taxes. In August I will send you a letter with your tax bill letting you know how much I have received and what is still owed, or a reimbursement check if you have over paid.

In the coming months I will be working on changing our accounting software over to NEMRC. Payroll has already been changed over and the rest will be changed over in July. I hope that this change goes smoothly and without too many bumps.

As always if you have any questions or concerns please feel free to contact me at the info above. My office is usually open Monday through Friday 8am to 12pm. I hope everyone has a wonderful winter, stay warm, and I will see you in March at Town Meeting.

Each year Vermont conducts a statewide sales equalization study. “real estate markets are always changing and reappraisals are not conducted annually. In order to treat all municipalities fairly throughout the state, grand lists are evaluated and adjusted annually to bring each municipality’s grand list to fair market value. The adjustment is made through the equalization study.”

We received the results of the study in late December 2016, which for Tunbridge indicated a Common Level of Appraisal (CLA) of 116.38% and a Coefficient of Dispersion (COD) of 9.75%. The CLA helps equalize sales values across towns; the COD is a measure of equity within the town. A COD of less than 10% is considered indicative of a high degree of equity within town. We are mandated to do a town-wide reappraisal if our CLA drops below 80% or our COD exceeds 20%; neither of these thresholds applies in Tunbridge this year.

A CLA over 100% indicates that property in town is generally listed (assessed) over the statewide statistical estimation of fair market value. Education tax rates are divided by the CLA; if the CLA is over 100%, the education tax rate is adjusted downward (as will happen in Tunbridge this year). Our last town-wide reappraisal was in 2010, and our CLA has crept up each year since (101.79%, 102.75%, 106.04%, 111.95%, 114.93%, 116.38%). The sales study includes valid sales from a moving window of the last 3 years. In 2016 this window included 32 valid sales, a level of activity we have not seen since 2009 (sales activity started tapering significantly after 2007, when the study included 47 sales in Tunbridge).

As challenging as it is, the goal is always to set a fair market value for each property in town and ensure that the costs of living and working here are borne as equitably as possible across the town and across the state. (Ask yourself, “what do I think I could sell my property for on the open market?”)

Helen O'Donnell's 3-year term as a lister will be up for renewal in March. Helen has been a Lister for many years. She knows Tunbridge and the community very well. She is very knowledgeable, brings a wealth of experience and is a pleasure to work with!

We are in the process of finishing up our southwest corner rotation and hope to begin the next one this summer. Our summer rotation will be the Northwest corner of town and we will send out notices before we go out. Since Tunbridge doesn't have a permitting process, this is our primary option for tracking changes to properties.

Our deadline for assessing property for the 2017 Grand List is on or before April 1, 2017. Any transfers we receive on April 2nd go on the 2018 Grand List. We may continue to look at properties but consider what is there as of April 1.

The Pastor Search Committee began its work in June by creating church history timeline panels. The timeline and artifacts were shown at a July pizza party where the search process was discussed. The Alliance for Vermont Communities was formed last fall in order to send a strong message to NewVistas Foundation that we do not want this out-of-scale, top-down project here, or anywhere in VT, and hope to discourage development plans and future land purchases.

Many thanks to all who responded to our town wide letter in December. The letters served to frame the issues before us, to point out the work that AVC is doing as well as what each and every resident could be doing and finally as a request to contribute to our organization. The effort raised \$2,300 from the town of Tunbridge alone. The donations help with operating expenses such as insurance, lawyers fees and outreach work. Thank you one and all for making it a success.

Our current efforts are focusing on making voters from the 4 affected communities of Royalton, Sharon, Strafford and Tunbridge aware of a non-binding resolution on each of the Town Meeting agendas. The resolution reads: "Shall the voters of the town of _____ oppose the NewVistas development?" The purpose of the non-binding resolution is threefold: first to bring the issue to the attention of the residents of the four towns through a Town Meeting discussion; second to send a loud and clear message to the legislators and governor of Vermont; and third, to send a message to the NewVistas Foundation. Public forums are scheduled in South Royalton (February 15, 7:15pm at BALE) and in Tunbridge (February 21, 7pm at the Tunbridge Library Community Room). **Vote YES to oppose!**

In ongoing work, AVC has assisted communications between town planning commissions in an effort to create necessary language in the plans to preserve the character and vision for the region. We have attended and made presentations at meetings of public committees, such as the planning and conservation commissions of the four towns. And we have spent time engaging elected representatives and political leaders and are pleased with the strong support we have received from them.
