I was recently looking at a book, *THE NEW DICTIONARY OF THOUGHTS* (printed in 1966!), and fell upon a page of “familiar phrases by Shakespeare.” I’ve never been much of a Shakespearian, but it is remarkable how much Shakespeare we use daily without necessarily knowing it. If you’ve ever said, “at one fell swoop,” or “the milk of human kindness,” or “I have not slept one wink,” than you’ve quoted the bard himself. It might be highly unlikely for Rodney Hoyt, our Road Foreman, to announce at the next Selectboard meeting, “Rough winds do shake the darling buds of May,” but you can be quite certain that he has observed that very phenomenon this spring. Mud Season was extraordinarily long this year, but thanks to the Road Crew’s prep and persistence, Tunbridge weathered it better than most neighboring towns.

It might not fit in a stocking or under the tree, but come Christmas 2017, the Road Crew will be in possession of a new six-wheel Freightliner dump truck. There was some debate over the merits of a ten-wheeler (it can haul more) versus a six-wheeler (more economical to run), but everybody agreed that a dump truck that consistently works is better than one that randomly breaks down. As for the lame duck Truck #5, I’m sure that Rodney has employed Shakespearean phraseology to describe it—perhaps “seen better days” or maybe “good riddance.”

The heart of metropolitan Tunbridge—by which I mean the Town Office building, the Church, and the Town Hall—is due for a freshening up this summer. During the upcoming warm months, a lot of white paint will be transferred from can to clapboard, and it should be fun to watch the progress as we travel back and forth on Vermont Route 110.

There have been some questions about the new Tunbridge website, tunbridgevt.org. If you wish to add anything to the website (say minutes from a committee meeting), it is best to get in touch with Jackie and she'll help you out. We hope to transfer archival material from the old website to the new website (say old TQs), but this process may take a while due to time and budget limitations.

The end of the Fiscal Year is not far off (June 30th), and it looks like both the General Fund and the Highway Fund will have surpluses. The Select-board has plenty of challenges ahead, but as our Chair said this morning, reached on the telephone in his barn, "things are going well." I couldn't say whether that's a direct quote from Shakespeare or not, but according to the UK's TELEGRAPH in 2010: "Performing William Shakespeare's plays to cows can help them produce more milk, farmers claim. Renditions of works by the 16th century playwright were found to "relax" a dairy herd and help boost production...Liam Batt, a farm worker, added, 'Perhaps there is something in the language of Shakespeare—we don't know, but it seems to work and milk production has gone up four percent.'"

The Tunbridge/Chelsea School Merger vote took place on April 11th. The merger passed, 151 to 109, with 260 voters participating out of 981 on the checklist. South Royalton, however, voted no to their merger, which puts ours temporarily on hold. There is a possibility of yet another vote this summer. The School Board will keep us apprised of any updates.

Happy Spring Tunbridge! I just want to remind every that if you have not filed your homestead declaration with your income taxes, do it soon. Also, remember to check your tax bill when you receive in Aug. to make sure you received a state payment if you think you are due one.

I want to give you a recap of Town Meeting and the budget that passed just in case you missed it. For the General Fund we passed a budget of \$357,772.25. This was amended slightly during the meeting to account for an increase in the First Branch Ambulance fees. The Highway budget we passed was \$730,500. The Volunteer Fire Department asked for \$31,300.00 and it passed. Lastly the appropriations budget passed with a budget of \$13,842.00, which was amended for an increase of \$250 for Safeline. These will be the figures for your municipal tax portion of your taxes. The tax rate should be set in mid to late July and tax bills should be out by mid to late Aug.

I also wanted to give you a quick update on the current Budget. This fiscal year is almost over. It looks like the highway is going to end with a substantial surplus due to a very late grant payment for the Recreation Road Bridge construction project. The general fund may also end the fiscal year with a small surplus.

With the close of the fiscal year my office will also be converting our accounting software from Quickbooks to NEMRC. I am very excited about this change, it will make my job a bit easier. There is however a great deal of work that goes into making this change. With this change, there will be a new system to collecting taxes this year. It should make things easier for everyone but please be patient as I figure it out. Also another change this year is that we will be able to accept debt card payment for taxes. This system should be up and running through the town website by September. I hope everyone has a great summer! Feel free to contact us with any questions.

UPDATE ON EDUCATION DISTRICT UNIFICATIONS IN THE WHITE RIVER VALLEY

On April 11, seven town school districts in the White River Valley voted on proposals to create unified school districts. The process of developing these proposals grew from Act 46, a law passed in 2015 to address Vermont's shrinking enrollment, loss of student educational opportunities, and rising tax rates.

The proposals were created through committed, creative work by three committees over a period of 9 months. Proposals called for dramatic changes in education service delivery in many towns. Committee members negotiated with one another to find common ground and were willing to agree to significant changes in the interests of all students in the region. Three separate committees proposed the creation of three new unified school districts, effective July 1, 2018, as follows:

White River Unified District: Bethel, Rochester, Royalton-- grades PK-12

First Branch Unified District: Chelsea, Tunbridge--grades PK-8, tuition thereafter

Granville-Hancock Unified District: Granville, Hancock-- all students tuitioned

To qualify for incentives, at least two of these proposals needed to be approved by voters--one of which needed to operate PK-12. Under current law, these approvals must be completed by June 30, 2017.

On April 11, the proposed unifications passed in six of the seven districts. Only Royalton voted against the proposed changes. Because creation of the two smaller mergers is contingent on the creation of the larger district, none of the three can proceed immediately. However, at this time, they are all still in process. Below is a clarification of where these proposed unifications sit:

Granville-Hancock Unified District-- This unification was overwhelmingly approved by the school districts involved. Should a PK-12 district get approved prior to June 30, the Granville-Hancock District will come into being.

First Branch Unified District-- This unification was approved by both towns. The plan calls for a merger of Tunbridge and Chelsea, and the closure of Chelsea High School in 2018. As with the Granville-Hancock plan, should a PK-12 district get approved this unification will automatically be implemented.

White River Unified District - This proposal passed in both Rochester and Bethel. It was defeated soundly in Royalton. Given the magnitude of the Royalton defeat, the PK-12 Study Committee is moving in the direction of

a proposal that involves only Bethel and Rochester. Passage of such a plan by June 30 would allow all three new districts to be formed and for all participating members to receive incentives and benefits.

It is possible that implementation of the smaller mergers could be made easier by the passage of pending legislation. However, at this time, it is not a sure thing and we cannot count on it. The three study committees will continue to keep our communities informed as this process moves forward. We remain confident that the proposals put forward by your committees are good for students and our communities, and we remain hopeful that they will be able to be implemented.

I get a morning report of Wild land fire conditions from Vermont, Forest, Parks and Recreation each morning. They are quite involved but I have found are pretty darn close to what I find in the fields and woods.

There are some changes in the law involving the state and Wild land fires. I will meet with the town select board and let you know how our town will address these changes. Just so you know we do have a Burn Ordinance in our town and it will most likely be updated soon. As soon as our town web site is up and running I will attempt to get it on there for your reading pleasure.

Call Brenda Field at 889-5548 or John Durkee at 889-3408 for a burn permit, we can give them out over the phone. It is a state "Permit to Kindle" brief form. You don't need to pick it up as long as I have the copies. Reminder again it gives permission to burn natural wood products only. Leave your name, address, what you are burning and call back number when calling. We will make every attempt to get back to you in a reasonable amount of time.

PS: In an attempt to maintain transparency I want you to know I got a raise from the state of VT to do this. I now receive \$30. per year.

Alliance for Vermont Communities

The Alliance for Vermont Communities (AVC) was formed last fall in order to send a strong message to NewVistas Foundation: We do not want this out-of-scale, top-down project here, or anywhere in VT, and hope to discourage development plans and future land purchases.

In an effort to make residents of the four affected towns of Royalton, Sharon, Strafford and Tunbridge aware of the NewVistas development threat, AVC coordinated placing a non-binding resolution on each of the Town Meeting agendas. The resolution read: “Shall the voters of the town of _____ oppose the NewVistas development?” The purpose of the resolution was three-fold: first to bring the issue to the attention of the residents of the four towns through a Town Meeting discussion; second to send a loud and clear message to the legislators and governor of Vermont; and third, to send a message to the NewVistas Foundation.

The combined result of the Town Meeting vote was overwhelmingly (90%+) in favor of the article. Here are the results:

Royalton	123 Yes	16 No
Sharon	100 Yes	16 No
Strafford	voice vote, overwhelmingly passed (186 voters present)	
Tunbridge	165 Yes	4 No

It is encouraging to have this strong, unified message of opposition coming from all of the towns most immediately affected. Below are just a few of the comments we have heard.

“My wife was teary-eyed watching it unfold, and I have to say my pride in our community reached a new level. A new sense of togetherness has emerged, which is a formidable fact for Hall and Ellis” – Tunbridge resident (Referring to David Hall, Utah developer and Kevin Ellis, hired Vermont lobbyist)

“Nice job to the Alliance with getting the resolution passed in all 4 towns. It definitely contributed to a very lively town meeting in Sharon - people care!” - Sharon resident

And this from Randy Leavitt, a member of AVC and resident of Royalton writing the day after Town Meeting.

“At the end of the day...we passed this resolution in every town. We got on the local and state news, people know about it now who did not know about it before...including, astonishingly enough, people in my own town. I was so surprised how little some people in Royalton knew about the truth. So, yesterday we told our story, and we told it really well. The best day since we heard this terrible news in my opinion. Onward!”

As expected, David Hall has said he plans to proceed and is not deterred by what the residents of the four towns think. The Valley News reported that David Hall said following Tuesday's vote that "his project remained far from realization and that he would continue to acquire the land needed regardless of current residents concerns." Valley News, March 8, 2017

Of course there is plenty of work to do as we use the momentum from this powerful victory to reach our dual goals of stopping this ill-conceived development as well as creating a vision for our communities that builds opportunities for the region. Coming up on June 18th is a benefit for AVC in the form of a mountain bike ride called "The Ranger". It's a day of riding, a day of community, of local food and beer to be held at the Fairgrounds and the surrounding hills. More info at www.therangervt.com/.

SRRS is an Advanced Life Support (ALS) service that covers Sharon, Royalton and the southern part of Tunbridge. We are a 24 hour service 7 days a week. We serve as mutual aide to First Branch and White River Valley as well when needed.

Our staff is composed of two Paramedics, five Advanced Emergency Medical Technicians (AEMT) and ten Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT). We presently have five of the EMT's in an Advanced class, to move into the advanced skill level in September. Our Administrator is Paramedic David Palmer, who has been a paramedic for 17 years and was the first paramedic in our area.

Our office is located at 186 South Windsor Street in South Royalton, which also is our sleeping quarters for the night shift. Our ambulance is housed in the South Royalton Fire Department. For NON emergency calls you may reach us at 802-763-8133. Please always call 911 for a possible emergency.

Your red 911 house number is our beacon to find you quicker. If you have one, it should be visible from the road. It will help us greatly especially in the evening hours. These numbers can make a difference in our response time to an emergency, when a few minutes can be valuable.

Spring is in the air, snow is almost gone. The White River is calling for many of us to come and play. Please know that the water is still very cold, and hypothermia can come quick. Dress appropriately and be safe. Turkey hunting is here be safe and have fun, wear the appropriate clothing. Warm weather also brings ticks. Check yourself, children and your pets regularly

If you live in our coverage area, we do provide a membership application. This is a yearly fee of \$95.00 for the household. Please call us to gain more information. We can mail to you all the information as well.

Please contact us about Lifeline, a medical alert service, as well. This can be a very valuable service to many.

We also distribute a small container called the Vial of Life. This is a small container that has all your vital medical information in it. Please call us and inquire. This is very helpful to EMS if you are unable to give this information.

Our mission is to serve the communities in our coverage area with a caring, certified staff to meet the emergency medical needs and to transport you as safely as possible to the appropriate hospital.
