The selectmen have voted to start using tickets at the transfer station instead of cash. There will be \$10, \$15, \$20 and \$30 tickets available for sale at the town office. Full enforcement is expected to take effect on March 29. At this point if you don't have a ticket you won't be able to leave your trash. Call 889-5521 for more details.

As of Nov 1, \$1,922,945.16 had been collected in property taxes. \$124,698.44 went delinquent. The percentage of taxes that went delinquent this year was about the same as last year (6%). I had thought it might be less because the education money came directly to the town, but there was no significant difference.

This year's selectmen budget shows an approximate 9% increase in both tax dollars (\$175,534 to \$193,865) and overall budget (\$309634 to \$341965). This is due mainly to the increase in both insurance and the county tax. The highway budget has a 15% increase (\$536600 to \$613100). This is largely reflected in the gravel, sand and equipment lines. Equipment went up \$35,000, because a new truck has been added, and the cost of fuel has increased. Appropriation funding remained relatively stable (\$97955 to \$99610). The municipal tax rate voted at last year's town meeting was \$.64, and this year it is estimated at \$.67.

The Tunbridge Broadband Committee is very excited about the Fiber-Optic project we are now involved in. If you haven’t heard, the plan is to run Fiber-Optic cable to every home and business in the region of 22 towns. Fiber-Optic cable carries the best possible high-speed internet service, television and telephone service too.

All the participating towns need to do to be included in the network is vote positively on town meeting day to join an inter-local agreement with the other towns. The money to build the network will be borrowed by the inter-local group (ECFiberNet) and not the individual towns, therefore the town’s credit rating is not at risk. The loan will be paid with the monthly fees that subscribers pay. Eventually, the system will pay for itself and all revenues will be distributed back to the towns.

Tunbridge Tree Warden

The town Tree Warden has jurisdiction over all roadside trees within 16' of the center line of the road. This excludes town, utility, and building and field access. If anyone notices trees being cut by individuals within the jurisdiction zone, please contact the Tree Warden immediately. The Tree Warden also plants new trees--as in the late 90's--in the villages. There is room for more trees. While the actual planting of trees is fairly easy, much energy goes into planing and funding. Anyone interested in helping to plant new trees should contact the Tree Warden.

The town of Tunbridge owns two town forests, the "Town Garage lot" and the "Drew Road lot".

The Town Garage lot is 51.8 acres, including the town garage and sand/gravel pit. There was a timber sale in the forested part of the property in 2000. It was marked by the County Forester and cut by Gordon Barnaby of Tunbridge. Harvest volumes were 16 thousand board feet of sawlogs and 194 cords of pulpwood for which the town was paid \$4,078. Gordon also constructed about 2000 feet of new trail and girdled a number of pasture pines as part of the sale.

The Drew Road lot is approximately 110 acres uphill and east of Tunbridge village. The County Forester marked and supervised a timber sale on this property that was cut by Calvin Johnson of Chelsea in 2002. Harvest volumes were approximately 115 thousand board feet of sawlogs and 643 cords of pulpwood for which the town received \$15,052. A small amount of trail construction and erosion control work was done as part of this timber sale.

No additional cutting is recommended on either property, until the County Forester has re-evaluated the condition of the forests in 2010.

Concerns from the Select Board and Road Foreman; If the remaining winter month's weather is similar to what we've had, residents may see a noticeable reduction of sand on the Tunbridge Roads.

Tunbridge and surrounding Towns are experiencing the same problems with the availability and cost of sand. The Select Board and Road Crew are currently discussing this issue and would like to talk to landowners in Tunbridge and or surrounding Towns that may have or know of locations that could be looked at for sand. If we are forced to purchase sand outside of Town or State Garages we are looking at a sand budget of \$100,000.00 or more in the near future.

Things started out very fast this second session. Many reports have been received at our request from last sessions work. We have been reviewing them and deciding if they require legislative work or not. We haven't set all of our priorities yet but will be taking up a couple more bills . One of them deals with allowing raw milk to be sold at more than the 25 qt./day limit now enforced. Also, bills have been introduced regarding on farm slaughter and dog tethering and a couple others we haven't had much time to review yet. The Agr. Dept. budget hasn't been released yet and once that has we will be disusing that and working to enlarge or transfer funds from one program to another if need be.

The portable inspected fowl slaughtering facility will be built by this spring and a person(s) will have submitted a winning bid to rent it from the Agr. Agency for this year to use. Once I have the information and contact number I will have it printed and available to all who may want to use it.

There are several other bills in other committees which I'm quite concerned about but don't have much knowledge about yet. H-549 concerns waterfront buffer areas. I'm for cleaning up and maintaining clean waterways; but this bill will allow Agency of Natural Resources control over all water fronts on ponds ,lakes and streams- including "intermittent watercourses that do not have continuous surface water flow". To me this would include almost every gully in Tunbridge; and they are talking about a 50 foot buffer on each side of this "waterway" in which you could not disturb vegetative growth, without a permit.

We also have started to receive several bills from the Senate, one being the new energy efficiency S-339 which I haven't read yet; it's 79 pages long. It's in the house's energy committee and they will be taking testimony and working on it. There have been over 700 bills introduced into the House theses past two sessions and I'm not sure how many in the Senate, 400+/-.

Tunbridge Board of Listers

The Board of Listers is getting ready for the upcoming town-wide reappraisal recently ordered by the state Dept. of Taxes. A new state regulation requires that the town submit a compliance plan before the work can begin. The plan must include the names and qualifications of all those participating, a time line, and a detailed budget. We are presently working on that plan. It must be completed in March.

We have learned that a reappraisal if done by an outside firm can be expected to cost on an average of \$90 per parcel. Our town has 931 parcels, 856 of which are taxable. The state requires that all properties be valued, including the non-taxable parcels. This means that if we hired out the work, we could expect it to cost in the neighborhood of \$84,000.

Don't panic! We are proposing to do the work in house, which we anticipate will cost considerably less, primarily because Listers work at a lower per-hour rate. As a rule of thumb, an in-house reappraisal can be expected to cost between \$50 and \$60 per parcel.

To help fund reappraisals, the state annually provides each town a sum of money based on the number of parcels in the town. We expect to complete the reappraisal for the 2010 tax year. By that time we expect to have about \$50,000 in the fund. We would like to think that this is enough money to complete the reappraisal work; however, if it is not we will be required to ask the town for additional funds. A lot will depend on how easily our statistical review can be accomplished. We will have a better handle on this when we have the new cost tables and can determine how they affect property values.

Meanwhile, we are in the process of finishing visits for this year. These visits include 15 new residences, camps or starts; four additions, 15 residences that have been substantially improved, and 30 updates of ongoing construction or improvements
