Tunbridge Select Board

The Selectboard has been working on several outstanding issues since Town Meeting, including a review and update of our personnel policies, establishing a town investment policy, and the adoption of a rental agreement for the town hall. We are continuing to work on the policies for town employees, including drafting clearer and more up-to-date job descriptions, and holding systematic annual reviews.

We are also working on a supplement to the town's burning ordinance, which would cover the burning of hazardous materials and ensure that the town could recoup its costs from an especially expensive or destructive fire. On the practical (rather than policy) side of things, the town has cleaned up some illegal dumping activity that has occurred in the last few months on Belknap Road.

As we look ahead to next year's budget (yes, we're starting early this year!) we have done a cost analysis of the town trucks and given thought towards how to balance planning for both maintenance and replacement. In the process, one of the trucks, the one-ton, used for necessary smaller projects and high-mobility plowing jobs-was found to have an annual maintenance cost that closely approached its replacement cost, so the board has therefore pursued replacing this unit.

In other news, the Selectboard is seeking applications for the position of Recreation Director, which is currently open. Responsibilities of the position include coordinating a number of sports activities and seasonal events, and pays a small annual stipend. If you are interested, please contact our administrative assistant Wendy McCullough to apply.

Finally, watch for an upcoming announcement for a special town meeting in June or July, as the selectboard may be requesting direction from the town on how to handle any surplus funds that may be left at that time.

Upcoming event:

We have seen a welcome but temporary respite in fuel prices due to the drop in demand from the down turn in the economy. When the economy picks back up, which I am betting it will, then prices will get back on the up escalator. For this reason alone we need to work on transitioning off fossil fuel.

State Representative

Things are fast and furious as they try to finish the session this week. H-125 Farm Fresh Milk passed the House and awaits any changes in the Senate. Currently it has a two tier system: Tier 1. up-to 12.5 gal/day with new labeling requirements for the barn and the bottles of milk. The milk must still be picked up only at the farm. Tier 2 farms must be subject to farm inspections and have their milk tested twice per month meeting lower counts than normal farms. They also have to label their milk and can sell up-to 40 gallons per day, with some off farm delivery if certain conditions are followed. We will see if it changes when it returns from the Senate.

The biggest problem right now is “balancing” the budget. When we passed the budget it was like swiss cheese: a \$24M hole which we were told to pass and would be filled in with new taxes later; a \$16M hole in reduced labor costs but don't worry we will tell you who later will loose their jobs!! How can one vote on such a budget. Now we had an up-date and there is \$40M shortfall in receipts so more money needs to be raised- still almost no talk about cutting any State expenses!! There also is little talk about the pending increase in un-employment tax. They are saying it will be depleted of all money by the end of the year, so they plan to slide an increase on the un-employment tax on the budget (I'm hearing up-to 100% increase) and hopefully nobody will notice!

The budget to run Transportation also is in financial trouble- steadily declining revenue. There is talk about reducing transfers out of transportation which goes to education, this can only mean an increase in property taxes- not desired either! When did “cut “ become a four letter word? All of these budget bills are in conference committee meeting so as a legislator it is hard to know what is being proposed and what deals are being worked out. When they come out we only get to vote them up or down we can not suggest changes. I will try to give a summary after this session is over. Remember any bill which didn't get to the floor of either chamber isn't dead it can still be brought-up and considered next session, and a bill which has only made it through one chamber could be considered in the other chamber next session.

Town meeting is over for another year. The 09/10 budget was approved as follows:

The estimated municipal tax rate for the next tax bill is \$.739. This is up \$.06 from the estimated tax rate in the town report. The tax for a property valued at \$150,000.00 would be \$1,108.50.

The current budget is looking pretty good. The highway may have a surplus. According to state law this amount can't be spent without voter approval. It does stay in the highway fund, and can be used to reduce taxes.

The equipment fund is a reserve fund and the budget is very close. The payment for the truck purchased in 2008 was postponed till the 09/10 fiscal year, so the budgeted amount of \$24,000 will stay in the fund. Another new truck has been purchased which was not in the budget. There are now payments for the grader, tractor and three trucks.

The selectmen budget is also very tight. Depending on last minute revenue there should be no deficit.

The selectmen are now having a budget meeting once a month, to keep on top of the current budget and to better understand what the needs for the next budget will be. We are also working on an investment policy. Other financial policies are in the works.

The selectmen approved the Fuel Assistance Loan Fund by-laws. A donation was received from the Civic Club. Any donation is greatly appreciated.

Tunbridge Board of Listers

The Board of Listers has scheduled its grievance hearings for 10 a.m. Friday, June 19 at the Town Office. Any property owner may grieve the assessed value at that time. Formal notices are sent to only those whose property has changed value for this tax year. At this writing the board expects to send approximately 75 notices of value change. The notices will be in the mail no later than June 4.

The entire assessment and grievance process is strictly set forth in the Vermont State Statutes. If you expect to grieve your assessment, you must notify the Listers of your intent in writing. The town's assessment must represent the property's probable selling price. We reappraised in 2002, so all properties are to be assessed at 2002 values. In other words, we cannot assess a property to reflect the 2009 selling price when all others are at 2002 values. (And, yes, the 2009 prices are considerably higher than 2002 selling prices.)

If you do not think that your property assessment reflects the probable 2002 selling price, then you should grieve the value. You must be prepared to present evidence demonstrating that your property is not assessed at the 2002 selling price. We have sales information in our office and spread sheets of assessments for easier comparison of similar properties. You are invited to use these if you are unsure whether the assessment is equitable or if you need assistance in finding comparables.

If you question your property's assessment, you must do so at the grievance hearing to preserve your options. Once the hearings are closed, the Listers must send notice of our decision within seven days. We then lodge the Grand List, which means we turn it over to the town clerk. After the Grand List is lodged, the Listers cannot make any changes. Changes may be made only by the Selectboard or the Board of Abatement and then only under specific circumstances, such as a fire which destroyed the property.

The board is no longer required to send notices to current use enrollees when the only change is in the current use value. New enrollees or those whose land allocation has changed will receive a notice.

Work continues on the reappraisal scheduled for completion of the 2010-2011 tax year. We are making a concerted effort to see the interiors of dwellings we have not seen in more than five years. Because of our rotational inspections, we will not need to review the exteriors of approximately half the town properties. However, we have not seen the interiors of many of those homes and may be knocking on the door asking to see the inside. The more interiors we view, the better job we can do in establishing equitable assessments.

The new fire truck has arrived! In case you missed the recent article in the Herald, our new Pumper truck is a four wheel drive, International with a 1,000 gallon on board water tank and a compressed air foam (CAF) system. The addition of the CAF system reduces the amount of water needed to suppress a fire, and increased the effectiveness of the water you spray onto a fire by mixing the water with a soapy concentrate which then clings to the fire and smothers it out. This new technology is a great advantage to our ability to fight fires that do not have a nearby water source, or to fight fires in the winter months when many water sources are frozen over. This new truck replaces our current Engine 2, which you can see now parked in the parking lot outside the fire house. The old Engine 2 is up for sale and is being advertised for sale on the internet.

Since our last TQ, we have successfully sold Engine 4 for \$4,000, and we have the old "Smokies" building with some industrial cooking equipment still in tact, up for sale. Please spread the word on these 2 items for sale. Anyone with an interest in purchasing either of these items should contact Chief Durkee.

At our annual meeting in March, the following years of service awards were made: Mike Morrison for 5 years, Simon Bradford and Thomas Hoyt for 10 years, Deb Button for 15 years, Pete Button for 25 years and Dan Roberts for 40 years. The ECFiber Committee and Valley Net have been working hard on a few different options for financing the project. At this point two of the options are looking promising:

We have been working to secure guarantees for some of the money so we can take it to the public market and sell it as a capital lease, as originally planned. Committee members have travelled far and wide to attend meetings with Alcatel-Lucent, the largest provider of telecommunications equipment in the world. Alcatel-Lucent has agreed in principal to provide a back up letter of credit up to the amount of our equipment purchase from them, which would be about 20 million. Currently we are working through the details of this arrangement.

Meanwhile we are also and applying for a loan thru the RUS (Rural Utility Service) which has stimulus money available. Our Project Managers Tim and Leslie Nulty have taken numerous trips to Washington to meet with the executives of the departments in charge of delving out the stimulus money and Patrick Leahy has been working hard for us too.

We strongly believe that one or both of these efforts will come thru and hopefully the project will break ground this summer. Still, the word is that we'll be hooking up customers one year after the money hits the bank.
