The PC went on hiatus in July. There were pressing Town issues and events making it difficult to plan a meeting. We will continue to meet the second Tuesday of the month at 7pm, although the August 10th meeting will begin earlier, at 6pm in the Town Office Bldg.

First Branch Sustainability Project

Tunbridge has won a grant of approximately \$51,000 towards a \$150,000 demonstration project to put 24 kilowatts of photovoltaic solar panels on the roofs of various town buildings. If installed these panels are likely to offset the usage of the town offices, the library and the town garage but are not large enough to offset the school's usage. In order to move ahead with this project the balance of the funds will have to be raised by a town bond.

The payback on this investment should be way shorter than the life of the installation there by giving ongoing electricity for free. This effort is the work of the Tunbridge energy committee headed up by Todd Tyson. Thanks also to Wendy and the select board who were also instrumental in obtaining this grant. Several new people are now joining the committee. We will be considering other ways for the community to save power and generate power from local and sustainable sources.

Other activity: The Chelsea energy committee has also raised grants. They have focused on weather tightening the Town hall and offices. The food group has revitalized the Chelsea farmer's market and is planning a harvest festival event for the fall.

Work is ongoing for the Transition Town model where we focus on making our communities more resilient and a place that delivers us a higher quality of life in spite of the likely hood of higher priced-shorter supplied oil and other economic anomalies that could lie ahead. Many other organizations are engaged with building community which is adding to this effort even though we are not formally tied together. Thanks to everyone. This blooming of activity is the model for the Transition Town initiative. Watch for an event on 10/10 to bring awareness to reducing global CO2 down to 350 PPM or even to the standard of new science of 290PPM.

First Branch Ambulance & Rescue

We've had a busy year so far and have seen our call volume increase when compared to last year at this time. The squad and fund raisers are preparing for the Fair-be sure to stop at our booth and help support us. We are struggling with reimbursement for services as everyone else in health care is. We are looking at various options and changes to our billing practices for the future in order to remain viable. We hope to provide some information to the town's once we have some plans formulated.

Tax bills will be mailed in September. This is later than previous years because I just received the final education tax rates from the VT Dept of Taxes, a result of the delay in passing the school budget. Also the Selectmen are holding a special town meeting on August 30, 2010 to determine what to do with the surplus money. If the taxpayers vote to use some of this money to reduce their taxes, the bills will then reflect that.

The municipal tax rate has been set at \$0.497. This includes money raised for the highway, the selectboard, appropriations, the fire dept., the ambulance, and any local agreements. Last year the municipal rate was \$0.742. The decrease in the tax rate is a result of the reappraisal. The Homestead education tax rate is \$1.2780 (last year \$1.8051) and the non-residential education tax rate is \$1.3496 (last year \$1.972).

There were some pretty significant budget surpluses at the end of the fiscal year. The selectmen's fund has a surplus of approximately \$83,467.07. The primary reason for this is an increase in revenues over and above the budgeted amount. The highway fund has an estimated surplus of \$96,869.73. This is probably due to the relatively easy winter and mud season. Actual expenses were lower than the budgeted amounts. Surplus money (a total of \$180,336.80) cannot be spent without taxpayer approval. The highway surplus can only be used on highway expenditures, including reducing taxes. The selectmen's surplus could be used in many ways. Talk to the selectboard if you have any good ideas, and the motivation to back them up.

The town-wide reappraisal is done, the grievance hearings have been heard, and all that is left are nine appeals to the Board of Civil Authority. (Two hearing dates will have passed prior to printing of this issue and the last is scheduled for Aug. 19.)

Now that the reappraisal is over and the new values lodged, our Common Level of Appraisal (CLA) is at 100%. If we could just convince everyone to sell their property at no more than the listed value, we could keep that CLA at 100% and then we would never have to do another reappraisal. We say that with tongue in cheek as clearly we cannot control selling prices.

After the appeals are over, we will revert to the routine work of a town lister: Inspecting and valuing any new construction or substantial additions or renovations, updating and valuing any unfinished properties, maintaining the town parcel map, and fulfilling state requirements concerning current use, housesites, and homesteads.

Our hours will be substantially reduced; however, we do expect to have the office open and records available most mornings. Don't hesitate to call if need something from our office.

With financing plans well underway, we have decided to proceed with a pilot project. At its regularly scheduled meeting, the EC Fiber Governing Board gave the go ahead to investigate the deployment of a pilot Fiber to the Home project within its territory. The Executive staff immediately set out to identify suitable target areas to begin deployment.

"We have identified several unserved areas that will help to prove our concept," said Project director Tim Nulty. "Engineering crews started the pre construction process the morning after the vote. We're very excited to get to work. This has been a long time coming."

The pilot project will provide a solid foundation for the capital lease used to build out the rest of the network, providing 100% coverage in 23 towns in East Central Vermont. While the intent of the project is to prove that the larger project is viable, according to Nulty, "it will be able to stand on its own if we don't raise another dime of capital." The pilot project will be financed with privately-raised funds.

The ECFiber home office and central hub will be located on Waterman Road in Royalton.

ECFiber is a grassroots initiative to build a state-of-the-art fiber-optic network in 22 towns, bringing digital television, reliable telephone, and high-speed Internet service directly to homes, schools, and businesses.

The school board wishes to start with a thank you to all community members for their support of education in Tunbridge as evidenced by the passing of the FY10 school budget in July. Although it may seem that the acceptance of a budget is a destination, it is actually just a mark in the year round financial activity of this community owned business of educating our youth.

In our preparation for another school year, we all reflect back upon the previous year for indicators of success. But unlike many locally owned and operated businesses, we cannot judge this by simply looking at our current financials. Our success is often not realized until years later when today's children become young adults. This delay makes the governance and operations of this business even more challenging than most.

To make things even more complicated, in response to the current economy the 2010 legislative session has passed three pieces of legislation that will have a dramatic impact on the business of education in Vermont. Board members of the Orange-Windsor Supervisory District schools have been holding additional meetings individually and collectively to determine how best to respond to this legislation. This legislation includes changes in the responsibilities for both the schools and the superintendent's office, guidelines for voluntary spending reductions and incentives for mergers/consolidations.

We are still in the early formulation of a series of responses to the legislation, but know that by year end we will be conducting a community forum to discuss our plans and receive additional input. Until then, please attend our board meetings to learn about the most recent progress we are making. We meet on the third Monday of each month at 6 pm in the school library.
