Tunbridge Planning Commission has been busy with the creation of the Town Forest Management Plan. In September we came together for a tour through both forest lots with Dave Paganelli, County Forester. On 10/10/10 we led a walk through the Drew lot to remove invasive plants.

On thurs. 10/28 at the Pot Luck, Dave and Dan Ruddell presented the findings of their inventory and we held an informal chat as we shared dinner. Dave and Dan are putting together the draft of the management plan. Our Planning Commission meeting on December 8th will be dedicated to a reading and discussion of the Plan. Please join us.

We continue to work on our "Patterns of Settlement" project which will demonstrate the change in Land Cover from about 1960 to the present. It will also show how farms have been sub-divided. We hope to present the information sometime in 2011. It will assist us in the review of the 2007 Town Plan which is up for renewal in 2012.

The re-constituted TEC, a spinter group of the First Branch Sustainability Network, met recently to discuss several efficiency, conservation & renewable energy initiatives for our town. In addition to co-sponsoring a "Button Up" forum to be held in the Chase Center at Vermont Law School from 6:30 - 8:30pm on Thursday, November 11th. The committee is inviting our fellow citizens to participate in an energy conservation "Storm Window Workshop" to be held at the Tunbridge Town Hall on Sunday, December 5th from 1-4PM. Attendees will assist in the fabrication of several interior storm window inserts that will be installed at the Town Library, the Town Hall and the Town Offices. Welch's True Value is helping to defray the supplies expense for this project and this initiative has been energetically supported by our Select Board. The savings from these windows is estimated to be one gallon of fuel oil for every square foot of window coverage per heating season. Workshop participants will learn the basic skills necessary to make their own inserts. A pre-workshop planning meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, December 1st at 7PM at the Parish House...the public is welcome.

In the coming months, the TEC will examine Tunbridge's current street light program as well as doing further research into community based energy sources including solar group net metering, community hydro and field testing for community wind. In September, tax bills were mailed with a total due to be collected of \$2,453,045.79. As of today (Nov 5) I have collected \$2,295,155.70, with \$157,890.03 going delinquent. Last year the amount billed was \$2,570.544.43, approximately 4.5% more than this year, and delinquencies totaled \$184,556.90 which is about 14% higher than this year. Is this proof that the economy is getting better?

Tax bills that have more than one name on them are mailed to the first person listed on the deed. If you need more copies please call after the bills have been mailed and I will send a copy.

On August 30th the town held a special town meeting to deal with the budget surplus from the 09/10 fiscal year and the extra money raised by the deficit tax line on your 08/09 tax bills. The results of that meeting are below.

- •Highway surplus (estimated amount) \$96,800.00 Purchase new loader \$80,000.00 Equipment replacement fund \$16,800.00
- •Selectboard surplus (estimated amount) \$83,400.00 Historical Society \$5,000.00 Reduce Taxes \$69,840.00
- Remainder \$8,560.00

Some of the remainder of the selectboard surplus may be earmarked for the purchase of the land near the recreation field, but no specific amounts were voted on.

The excess money raised by the deficit tax on your 08/09 tax bill was originally about \$30,000.00. At town meeting \$15,000.00 of that was put into a paving fund, and at the special town meeting the other \$15,000.00 was put into a septic replacement fund.

In this year's budget there was \$18,000.00 budgeted for efficiency improvements to the town buildings and \$15,000.00 for the town garage. I was hoping not to have drafts this winter, so if you have the skills please talk to the selectboard.

A concern raised at the special town meeting was about the current budget and if we could expect a surplus like last year. As of the end of October when about 33% of the budget should be spent, the highway has spent 32.5% and the selectboard has spent 30.1%. On the income side, the highway shows nothing unusual, but the selectboard received \$19,000.00 more in current use reimbursement over what was budgeted.

You probably don't think of "Board of Listers," "computer technology" and "Wi-Fi" in the same sentence. However, our lister office is a "hot-spot."

Perhaps as you passed the office you wondered what those folks are doing sitting in their cars. More than likely they are logged on to our Wi-Fi network and enjoying high-speed internet. (Some folks come inside to take advantage of this service.)

So why has our office created "a hot spot?" Here's the story. Pretty much all of our state services are delivered via the internet. This includes: Updates for both the mass appraisal and the Grand List programs; downloads of the homestead declarations, state tax payments, current-use information and sales study information; transmissions of various types of grand list information between our office and the state; and technical assistance whenever we have an issue with one of the programs.

For years we accomplished these procedures using the snail's pace dial-up connection. But in the spring of 2007 the state techs advised that we needed a high-speed connection if at all possible.

We went to the Selectboard and obtained permission to hook the office up to cable. We talked with the cable folks and had the service installed. Anne and I drilled holes in the floor (no easy task for two not-so-handy types), and ran cables to all the computers in the building. We called the state techs and our office computer tech, Tom Henderson, who networked the three lister computers.

And we did one last thing: For little cost, we added a second router to provide wireless internet service outside the office network. This means that anyone can use our high-speed connection, but can't log on to our internal network.

We also have also set up a public access computer. On this computer you may obtain lister information of a town property, including a picture and sketch, a parcel map of any property, and Grand List information including tax bills. We can also e-mail these documents upon request.

Now that Election Day has passed, many people have put legislative thoughts to the back of their minds, at least until 2012. However, this newly elected government will be closely followed as it is likely to have a direct impact on the future of education, especially following the changes made last year.

As we continue to monitor and provide input into legislative matters, we will continue to conduct our normal business. Currently the focus of our meetings and discussions are in the areas of budget, educational values, governance and negotiations. BUDGET - The first draft of the budget has been created and will serve as a starting point for our discussions and adjustments. The Challenges for Change target reduction for Tunbridge is \$27,210. Over the next several months we will be working on how to address this area while covering the loss of several grants, an increase in health care and dental premiums, and rising special education costs. As expected, managing the budget continues to be one of the most challenging aspects of our responsibilities. VALUES – With a need to stabilize the budget in a time of rising costs, the Board and community have recognized the importance of prioritizing our expenditures. In order for us to do this we are in the process of gathering input on what we value in our local education system. This will ensure that all programs being funded are working towards either supporting these values or meeting government requirements. With this in mind an education forum is scheduled in Tunbridge for Saturday, November 20 at 10 a.m. at the school. We are encouraging all community members to attend and provide input on this important topic. GOVERNANCE – For those that follow local news, you will note that the forum being held in Tunbridge is actually part of a series being conducted throughout the OWSU district. These forums are being sponsored and moderated by all Boards within the district and are a reflection of the collaborative approach being taken to respond to the recent changes in education. We are actively working together to improve local education for all by reducing the long-held mindset of "us" against "them." We feel that working collectively and collaboratively can help us in improving efficiencies, sharing resources and streamlining processes, which will allow us to maintain a sustainable high-quality local education.

NEGOTIATIONS – This collaborative approach can also be seen in the area of teacher negotiated agreements as one of the state mandates is that we conduct district wide merged bargaining by 2012. ECFiber.Net

The East-Central Vermont Community Fiber-Optic Network (ECFiber, an interlocal agreement among Tunbridge and 22 other towns) is slowly moving towards its goal of providing universal fiber optic high speed Internet in our towns. As many of you know, our plan for a public offering was all set to go about two years ago until the September 12, 2008, demise of Lehman Brothers essentially shut down capital markets. Since then we have unsuccessfully sought Federal government stimulus money, and we have been attempting to restart our public offering.

You may have read recently of a Federal government grant of \$81 million and a government backed loan of \$35 million to Vermont Telephone (VTel) for broadband communication, which was represented by some political figures as a "game changer." For the 19,000 subscribers in VTel's 14 town service area, this will provide high speed Fiber to the Home (FTTH) internet service similar to what ECFiber plans to bring to its 23 towns. This is very good for them. For the rest of Vermont's residents without high speed Internet, VTel plans to build out its Wireless Open World (WOW) service over the next three years. While wireless service is certainly better than dial-up, it will not allow for all the uses of the Internet, like streaming video. Also, because of the nature of wireless connections, this network will have many pockets of unserved areas.

ECFiber has begun plans for an initial "pilot project" to get things moving. Phase 1 provides the technical and financial foundation for the full 23-town project, so it is a very important first step toward our 23 town goal. This phase includes an area within a radius of approximately 10 miles from the central office, located near I-89, Exit 3, in Royalton. Applications for attachment to the first 500 poles has already been submitted, and the central hub design is underway. This opening phase is funded totally through a private placement of tax-exempt notes, and about 90% of the minimum amount we need has already been committed. On August 30th, a Tunbridge Town Meeting was called to discuss the use of surplus town funds. At this meeting, the Recreation Committee requested some of the surplus funds be used for the Tunbridge Recreation Area revitalization project, more specifically to purchase the property adjacent to the ball field and demolish dilapidated building on site. The town voted yes to this request providing that an environmental review/test be done on site before purchase. 50% of the total cost of land purchase and demolition will be reimbursed by a Land and Water Conservation Fund grant.

In addition to the LWCF grant, the committee also applied for a Recreational Facilities Grant to help fund a new playground for the Recreation Area. We just received great news—they will be funding our project at \$10,000! This grant is also a matching funds grant, so the other \$10,000 will be funded by the Committee's savings which is largely made up of donations and additional funds we have raised over the past few years.

We hope to have a drastically improved Recreation Area for our community to enjoy by the end of next summer. We still have a huge amount of work ahead of us, so please let us know if you have any interest in helping with this project!
