We have two major accomplishments this year. First, we have a draft of the Tunbridge Forest Management Plan. This was created in a cooperative effort between Dave Paganelli, County Forester, and Dan Rudi Rudell, Tunbridge Planning Commission. We are hoping that the Town Forest has come into the consciousness of the community through this effort. The final draft will be submitted to the Select Board for their action.

The second accomplishment is our receipt of a State Municipal Planning Grant for the completion of the "Patterns of Settlement" project. Two Rivers-Ottawaquechee Regional Commission will assist us with the mapping portion as well as the public outreach. This study will have an impact on our Town Plan. We will need to have your input into the findings and how they should be used in determining the future of the Town. Finally, we will try to piggy-back with the activities planned by the anniversary committee over the year. This year, I am encouraging interested residents to look at our town report and talk to the officers coming up for re-election. This is probably the best way to find out what the job really entails. Then talk to folks affected by that person's job to gather further information. One individual's service can truly make a difference in a small town like ours.

State Representative

The legislative session is off to a flying start. I was appointed to the Education Committee and asked to serve as Clerk. It's hard to imagine a better fit for our district as we struggle with high property taxes, difficult school budgets, school-merger discussions, workforce development, early childhood education issues. I offer a unique perspective to my committee since I am entirely "Vermont-educated" – pre-school through law school. Our top priorities this year include: taking a critical look at education governance, closing the academic achievement gap between low-income children and their peers, and addressing education funding problems. Here's a sampling of other issues the House is working on:

- Changing the definition of poultry products to not include quail, pheasant, and partridge for purposes of slaughter.

- Implement parts of the "Farm to Plate Plan" through primary and secondary school initiatives, agricultural distribution changes, expanding processing facilities (including slaughter), nutrient management innovations, land access and raw material expansion, and transition/succession plans for family businesses.

- Single-payer health care. Dr. Hsiao released an outline of three health care options for the legislature to consider adopting. We expect a final report on Feb. 17th. Keep this in mind as you read about these plans: Our goal is to curb the skyrocketing healthcare costs we bear under our current structure. "Doing nothing" is not an option for our state financially.

- "Line of Duty" Death Benefit. This past year, there was an off-duty volunteer firefighter who stopped to help with a car accident, and was then sadly hit and killed himself. His family did not receive his \$50,000 state death benefit because he was not on duty, even though he had an obligation to assist. Under this law, the family of an off-duty emergency first responder such as a firefighter or EMT would receive their state death benefit if they died while performing or responding to the need for emergency services.

• The Blue Ribbon Tax Commission released its final report two weeks ago. The legislature requested this report because it gives us the opportunity to look at our tax system in the context of the whole, rather than individual tax provisions. The recommended restructuring is revenue neutral, meaning that it will raise the same amount of money that is raised now. This is not an attempt to raise taxes. The recommendations will align our tax methods with most other states by allowing businesses thinking of locating to our state the opportunity to compare “apples to apples.” The way our tax structure works now, it is difficult to see how we actually compare, and it looks like we are a higher tax state than we really are. Note: The report is only a recommendation. No changes have been made and the Legislature may pick and choose which recommendations to adopt -- if any. The Ways and Means Committee will be dealing with the Tax Expenditure Bill separately from the Blue Ribbon recommendations. Next week, the committee will examine our current tax expenditures (more commonly known as “tax breaks”).

The Town Report has arrived at the office. I haven't had time to give it a detailed look, but I like the new format.

The combined budgets for the highway and selectmen show spending for FY 11/12 to be \$1,132,261.00. This is an increase of \$39,085.00 over last year, which is a 4% increase. Taxes to be raised however show an increase of \$81,763.00 which is an increase of 11%. This would be an estimated \$.05 increase in the tax rate, or an additional \$125.00 on your tax bill for a property valued at \$250,000.

On page 15 of the town report is the auditor's estimate of taxes. Last year's tax rate was \$.455, this year's estimate is \$.55 (almost \$.10). This is due to an increase in all budgets and because there is no deficit money to be applied to reduce it. This tax rate would add \$250.00 to your tax bill for a \$250,000 property value.

Tunbridge Board of Listers

Things are very quiet at the lister's office. We have completed the town-wide reappraisal and have chosen to visit only properties with large changes and not do our rotational visits for the 2011 Grand List. We will begin our rotational visits this summer for the 2012 Grand List.

We divide the town into quarters and each year we concentrate on one of those areas. That means we look at the exterior of every property in that area, take exterior pictures, and do interior inspections as warranted.

Our rotational visits do not constitute a "rolling reappraisal." If we decide to decrease or increase a value, the new value will represent the 2010 sale's value, the fair-market value at the time of town-wide reappraisal. With a "rolling reappraisal" the new values are changed to represent the new year's sales' values. For example if your property was one of those visited in 2011, your new value would represent 2011's fair-market while the rest of the town would be at 2010 levels. Our board does not like this method and so have chosen to do rotation reviews instead.

It is important that we review all properties on a regular basis. Things change. An owner may add a room, demolish an outbuilding, cover a porch or remove a deck. An owner may make changes that radically upgrade the condition of the house, or something may happen the just as radically downgrades the condition.

Meanwhile, regardless of whether a property is part of the year's rotation, we are required to revalue for any large sweeping changes, such as the construction of a new building or an addition that substantially changes the size of a dwelling

All properties must be assessed as they exist on April 1st. We may continue to visit properties after April 1, but may not consider any improvements made after April 1. For example, if you move a doublewide on your property on April 1, it will be assessed for that year's Grand List; but if you brought it in April 2, it will not be assessed for that year.

Official notification of any change in appraisal is sent in late May or early June. Official grievance hearings are scheduled no less than two weeks after the notifications are mailed.

Farm to School

Farm to School programs are blooming locally, throughout the state of Vermont, and around the country. The process of connecting kids with local farms while introducing food education into the classroom and local food into the cafeteria is taking root. Sharon Elementary, Randolph, and the South Royalton school system (among others) have created vibrant Farm to School programs. They offer students many hands-on opportunities that include preparing and tasting test fresh, local food, gardening at school, learning about plant life cycles and nutrition in the classroom, and taking field trips to local farms to plant and harvest vegetables and learn where food comes from. In short, Farm to School programs, often referred to as F2S, aim to cultivate connections between farms, community, classroom, and cafeteria while supporting local agriculture.

I am pleased to share with you that Tunbridge Central School has received a "Rozo McLaughlin Farm to School" Planning Grant from the VT Agency of Agriculture. It was a very competitive year with fewer awards available and more applicants than usual. We're fortunate to have this opportunity!

A F2S Planning Committee comprised of interested faculty, administration, farmers, parents, and community members will be creating a F2S plan unique to Tunbridge. The goal of the committee is to create an action plan and with that, apply for the \$15,000 "Rozo" F2S Implementation Grant. We hope to create a plan that provides great opportunities for kids, addresses needs, obstacles and program sustainability, and moves at an unhurried, manageable pace.

Tunbridge Central School F2S program will need community support. If you have an interest in farms, gardening, local food, etc., we invite you to join our efforts. We are planning the formation of a Tunbridge group that would provide community-based support to this school effort, just like Royalton Roots and Sharon Sprouts give community assistance to their local F2S programs.

On Wednesday, March 16 at 6:30pm, we plan a first gathering of this community group at the Town Hall. Everyone who is interested in local farms, fresh food, and community participation are welcome. If you would like to get involved with this exciting program, participate in the planning process, and/or have ideas about F2S you'd like to share, please contact Mary Zentara..

Tunbridge School Board

This year has been a year of changes at the Tunbridge Central School. As anticipated at the last town meeting, this fall we created a classroom cluster of grades 3, 4 and 5 with two teachers. Given the short preparation time, the challenges of aligning schedules, and a temporary change in staff due to a death in the family, our teachers have done extraordinarily well in making these new class groupings a success. There have been a few bumps in the road as adjustments and improvements were made, but we are assured that this structure is sustainable and worth the investment of our resources. We thank all of those involved for their commitment to making this transition as comfortable and easy for the children as possible.

Another significant change this year was a shift from owning our own buses to contracting this service with Butlers Busing. While it was initially believed that this could be achieved with one bus, it was quickly recognized at the start of the school year that the schedule was unrealistic and we moved to two buses. There has been a transition period as we coordinated policies, expectations, and communication lines, but overall it has been a positive experience. This is especially apparent during the few times when a bus was unable to complete a run and Butlers was able to quickly provide backup transportation.

As you are likely aware, the current three-year teacher agreement will expire at the end of June 2011. Negotiations with members of the Teachers Association have started and are progressing nicely. There is little to report at this time but as we are meeting approximately twice per month, we hope that we will come to a satisfactory agreement within a reasonable time frame.

We would like to remind the community that the School Board meets the third Monday of every month in the school library at 6 pm. Feel free to stop by and let us know what is on your mind and to learn about what is happening within your school.

We also encourage families with children at TCS to work directly with the teachers about any concerns about their child's education and experiences at the school. Strengthening this bridge between families, students and educators ensures that the needs of the children can be met to the best of our abilities.

First Branch Ambulance & Rescue

The Board of Directors for FBA & R has been working diligently on ways to contain operating costs for the ambulance service without increasing the funds we need to ask the two towns for. When you receive your town report you will see we have asked for an increase from 20,000 to 30,000 from both towns. We worked hard to have a balanced budget and still maintain a quality service for our towns. Unfortunately this has been happening at the same time that we've seen decreases in the reimbursement rates and increases in the amount of unpaid services. Much of this has to do with what is happening nationally within our health care system and is something everyone is having to face.

Since this is effecting everyone in our area we have joined the other ambulance services in our district, along with Gifford Medical Center, in a Memorandum of Understanding to work on plans for the future. We have been meeting and are moving toward a goal of working together, maintaining quality service to our towns; while still keeping the local presence in our communities, and hopefully creating a sustainable and predictable service. We all feel strongly that the members of our squads are the backbone of our organizations' success and want to keep that involvement and provide the support and training they need to do their jobs.

This is a work in process with many people involved and lot of hours of work ahead of us but I believe we are on the right track. As this unfolds we will be communicating to the towns what we have come up with.

As always, if there are any questions or concerns please ask one of the board members or attend a meeting. We meet the third Tues. of the month at 7:00pm from January - June at the Tunbridge Fire Station and from July - Dec. at the Chelsea Fire Station.

This news from our latest press release:

ECFiber's Treasurer, John Roy of Vershire, announced that the closing of Phase I Financing concluded on schedule and ahead of projections. A total of \$907,500 was raised through private local sources exceeding the original goal of \$850,000. ECFiber expects to begin construction in the spring.

ECFiber Governing Board Chair Loreda Sola of North Pomfret said, "This is a very important and hard-fought first step. Phase I establishes a baseline for building and operating cost, build time, expected market penetration, and resulting revenue. That baseline gives ECFiber a solid platform on which to build its network to all twenty-three ECFiber member towns."

"More importantly," said Sola, "this community-raised financing demonstrates confidence in a community-owned and managed network as well as frustration that public and private promises to bring us broadband have fallen way short. Here's an example in true Vermont tradition of communities stepping up and taking charge."

ECFiber's original financing plans were derailed by the meltdown of global financial markets in 2008. Since then, the volunteer-run organization worked diligently to find alternatives to build a fiber-to-the-home network connecting every home, business, and public institution in its territory.

For over ten years, the Fire Department has tried to incorporate long term planning in their budgeting process. Below is a list of equipment we currently have in service, as well as some plans for the future. All pieces of apparatus will hopefully provide 30 years of service to the Town of Tunbridge.

Currently we have:

1. 1991 Pierce Arrow Pumper
2. 2004 International 2,000 Gallon Tanker
3. 2009 KME CAFS Pumper

Currently we are funding the debt service of the 2009 KME Pumper at a rate of \$30,000 a year to be paid off in November 2014.

We plan to continue to fund the equipment replacement at a rate of \$30,000 a year. The estimated replacement period for the 1991 Peirce Arrow will be approximately 2021. If we can get more years of service out of this piece of apparatus then we will. We hope this gives you some idea of our long term plans related to the apparatus we currently have.

A quick reminder for residents who have an alarm system that automatically sends out a call for help when triggered. If you do not need the fire department to respond, please contact 911 to cancel the automatic call for help. We have responded to more than one alarm call in the past where, upon arrival, we were told that our help was not needed.

Our annual meeting will be held on Thursday, March 10th at 6:00pm at the Town Hall. Please join us for a potluck dinner & dessert followed by our business meeting. We are actively seeking members of our community who are not members of the fire department to serve on the department's Board of Trustees and to fill the role of Secretary. A Trustee typically attends one 1-hour meeting per month on the second Thursday of each month. Our Secretary takes the minutes of our business meeting once per month.
