Tunbridge Treasurer

The tax rate has not been set as of this writing. The estimated rate is \$0.55. This is \$0.095 higher than last year. The education tax rates are \$1.335 for non-residential and \$1.2555 for homestead properties. The education rates have dropped slightly from last year tax bills will be mailed sometime in August.

There were surpluses this year again in both the highway and selectmen budgets. The highway has about \$80,000 and the selectmen have about \$34,000. This cannot be spent without taxpayer approval. It can be used in the budget for the 12/13 fiscal year or there could be a special town meeting. The reason for the highway surplus is that there was \$11,000 more income than budgeted and \$22,000 less expended. State aid income was up and labor, material and equipment maintenance expenses were all less than budgeted.

The selectmen surplus was due to \$46,000 more income and \$34,000 less expenses. Current use, penalty and interest on delinquent taxes and clerk fees were all up and transfer station tickets income was down. On the expenses side insurance and dues were less than budgeted and \$16,000 of the money budgeted for efficiency improvements for the town buildings was not spent. Tunbridge Planning Commission

We are making progress on our three major projects. First, Tunbridge received a Municipal Planning grant of \$10,000 with the assistance of Two Rivers-Ottawaquechee Regional Commission. This grant will be used to assist in the update of the Tunbridge Town Plan, and especially with the "Patterns of Settlement" project. Part of this project is public outreach. The date and manner is yet to be determined, so stay tuned.

On May 3 The PC presented the Town Forest Management Plan to the Select Board and it was approved. Contact Wendy or Rudi Ruddell if you are interested in reviewing the plans.

Finally, the Planning Commission heard from Preston Bristow who acts as zoning administrator for several area towns on his role as the Flood Plain Hazard Administrative Officer. The PC is working on updating the Flood Plain Hazard Ordinance and an Administrative Officer will need to be selected.

The Tunbridge Historical Society will take part in the Aug. 20 White River Valley Historical Fair at the S. Royalton School from 9-4. This event alternates with the Vermont Historical Society's Vermont History Expo. The society will exhibit enlargements of glass plate negative photographs taken by Carl King on Spring Road and around the area before 1904. Carl King's uncle was A.N. King, bank president and wealthy businessman who owned the village store and a lot of Tunbridge real estate. Brookie Ketchum, whose Monarch Hill home is owned by her grandson Todd Ketchum, was Carl's granddaughter. Brookie's son Karl recently gave the historical society a disk with the images.

Fair speakers will include Euclid Farnham on Vermont in the Civil War and Bill Johansen on Bethel's Italian community. The fair will feature the Rochester Valley Players, authors, exhibits and artisans.

Soon tax bills will go out and the lister phone will begin ringing. The conversation will go something like this:

Caller: Why did you raise my taxes! I can't afford to live here if this continues.

Lister: The tax rate went up. I don't think we increased your assessment. Let me check. No, your assessment is the same as last year. Your taxes are higher because the tax rate is higher.

Caller: Well, what are you going to do about it! It isn't fair. When I bought my house I only paid a few hundred dollars, now the bill is thousands.

Lister: We sure do wish we could reduce everyone's taxes including ours. But the lister board just doesn't have the power to determine how much the town spends. At town meeting we voted for lots of increased spending, new equipment and the like. We will be more than happy to discuss your assessment, but, unfortunately, there is nothing we can do about your taxes.

An increase in taxes is frustrating. We the citizens vote on whether to accept or reject the budgets prepared by the selectmen and the school board. If you are concerned about your tax burden, call a select board or a school board member and discuss with them the budget on which you will ultimately vote.

The only time the Listers can take an action that may result in a reduction of taxes is if the property depreciates in value, like you tear down part of your house or let it fall down from neglect, or you create a dump site next to your home. You get the idea. Note: We said "may" result, because if the tax rate increases substantially, your taxes could increase despite a reduction in property value.

Meanwhile, lister board members are here to serve, and if you have any questions about your assessed value, we are most pleased to answer them. We actually like talking about market values and other things that have to do with our job. Call any time. If we are not in the office, we'll get back to you. Or if the matter is pressing, give us a call at home.

In another matter, we are doing our rotational inspections in the southwest portion of town. This is NOT another reappraisal (thank heavens!). These inspections are drive-bys or quick walk-arounds to determine if there has been any changes in the property. Because our town has no notification process, this is the only way for us to keep up on any major changes that might alter the value of a property.

The town folk have been enjoying the summer. There have been some great turnouts for the 250th celebrations. We would like to say thank you to all the volunteers who have put forth a grand effort to make these celebrations a success. The weather has been quite cooperative for the majority of the season and we hope to have a wonderful Fall Season as well.

We have completed the purchase of the former Mark Green Property next to the Recreation field. This was done with the towns' approval at the Special Town Meeting held last summer. The purchase was funded 50% from the town and 50% from a grant. The Recreation Department went to work on the demolition almost immediately after the purchase was complete. Tom Wells donated his time and his excavator to demolish the old building. We would like to say thanks to him and our road crew who helped with the cleanup. The area looks much improved. We are looking forward to hearing from the Recreation Department in regards to future plans for this area.

The Foundry Bridge Project will soon be completed in its' entirety with the finish of pavement to both ends of the bridge. The pavement, previously scheduled for late last Fall, was postponed due to the encroachment of the winter season and cold weather. The addition of this pavement should prove quite helpful to our road crew in maintaining the bridge and the road abutting it.

The highway crew is working diligently through the summer to keep the roadsides trimmed back and to keep the road surfaces smooth. We welcomed our road Foreman, Rodney Hoyt, back to working status in May. His return has been greatly appreciated by the select board, as well as the rest of the road crew. Our sand stockpile is being replenished in anticipation of another winter season. Road re-surfacing is being completed on an "as needed" basis. Ditching and Culverts will be on the forefront of our concerns as we move into the coming season. Farm to School is taking root at Tunbridge Central School and within the community. Exciting activities, programs, and learning opportunities have been cultivated and more are on deck for the upcoming school year.

F2S Happenings Over the Past School Year:

- TCS began a school wide composting program funded by the Central Vermont Solid Waste District. Several tons of food waste were diverted from the landfill, picked up by the Solid Waste District, and turned into garden compost.
- Students, led by Stephanie Loeffler during the After School Program, planted peas, carrots, potatoes, and beans in the School Garden. Over the summer, a group of children in the One Planet Program tended the garden, harvested vegetables, and enjoyed eating fresh peas right off the vine.
- Wendy Palthey from Tunbridge Hill Farm shared her knowledge about food and farming and provided fresh veggies for students to sample during the After School Program.
- Students participated in a year long Healthy Snacks Program.
- One Planet After School Program offered cooking classes taught by Abby Brabham.
- Elaine Howe read food and farm related books to multiple grades.

F2S Plans for the Upcoming 2011-12 Year:

- Carrots, potatoes, and beans will be harvested from the School Garden by students in TOP and served in the cafeteria.
- Elizabeth Dutton was awarded a science unit grant. This will provide an opportunity for students to study botany in the fall, food and where it comes from in the winter, and plan a class garden in the spring.
- Cooking classes using local food will be offered during the After School Program.
- "Taste of Tunbridge" for parents and students to sample local food from area farms and get to know local farmers.
- School wide taste testing of local food and recipes.
- Local food such as carrots and greens will be served in the cafeteria this fall.
- Farmer panel to talk with students.
- Building a bread oven at TCS. And more...

We are happy to announce that the first phase of the Tunbridge Recreation Area Revitalization Project has been completed! In mid July, the Town of Tunbridge purchased the parcel of land adjacent to the town ball field. \$4500 of this purchase is reimbursable thanks to a Land and Water Conversation Grant the town received in 2010. In late July, Tom Wells took down and removed the dilapidated metal barn on this property. We would like to thank him for generously volunteering his equipment and time. The White River Partnership has been doing weekly bacterial testing on the Tunbridge Town Pool tributary to determine water quality. The weekly results have been within the safe "swimmable" standard, so we encourage you to take a dip!

The recent debate in Washington surrounding our nation's fiscal health has highlighted the importance of balanced spending when revenue streams become unsteady. For decades, Vermont has demonstrated an arguably masterful proficiency in this area, leaving us in "good" shape relative to other states. The state's fiscal year ended on June 30th and reports show that we are starting to regain financial strength, demonstrated by an uptick in revenues. This is great news for Vermonters because it indicates stability, helping the legislature to better predict the availability of funds we manage.

While our state's financial health could easily be the envy of Washington lawmakers, Vermonters aren't feeling great relief yet. The two biggest cost complaints raised by constituents are related to health care or property tax. We spent a large part of the 2011 session devising a coherent system of health care administration that could lessen the cost for Vermonters. Ultimately, we authorized a pathway to a "fewer-payer" (as opposed to a single-payer) universal health care system. By October 1st, a handful of appointed officials will start working to design a structure, select a menu of services, and review funding options for the plan. The magnitude of the problem is enormous and consequences of "getting it wrong" could be severe. This is why we are taking the time to research, answer, and design a system that is right for Vermont.

Next session, I expect the House will focus on property tax reform. We passed a bill this spring that calls for a detailed study of Act 68 review will be submitted to the legislature in January and will likely be the basis for substantial property tax reform bills next spring.

The Vermont Department of Labor has announced temporary employment opportunities in the counties affected by May's devastating floods. Workers who have been temporarily dislocated as a result of the flooding, dislocated workers who are unemployed and not receiving government support, and workers who have been unemployed for 15 weeks or longer may qualify for these temporary jobs. In other news, I was selected to join 50 other "Emerging Leaders" at a National Legislative Leaders Conference in Charlottesville, VA in July. I really enjoyed connecting with colleagues in other states and discussing ways to do our jobs better. In preparation for the conference we were required to read several books, including Tony Wagner's "The Global Achievement Gap." I highly recommend it.

I am delighted to report that Tunbridge is gaining another resident very soon. I am purchasing a home in town and look forward to the first time Speaker Smith refers to me as "The Member from Tunbridge." According to Euclid, it has been about 40 years since the House Chamber has heard those words uttered!
