Tunbridge Board of Listers

These spring months are the busiest time for the board, as we finalize the abstract (draft) of the Grand List. This effort includes receiving and reviewing homestead and Current Use reports, entering exemptions, and concluding our visits to assess any changes in properties. We continue to work for transparency as we attempt to meet the rising standards of various programs and state regulations. If the value of your property has changed from the 2011 value you will be sent a Change of Appraisal Notice. If your property value has not changed, you will not receive a formal notice, unless you requested one. The 2012 current use allocation will be sent to enrollees in early June, at the same time that change-of-appraisal notices are sent out.

If you have land enrolled in the Use Value Appraisal program (Current Use), your application should have a map showing any land that is excluded. Due to the evolving nature of the UVA program, we are valuing the excluded land at the graded land values of the excluded acreage as mapped (in the past we have used an averaged value across all land grades, multiplied by the acreage of the exclusion). This may cause some variation in the value of the excluded/enrolled land values.

The Board of Listers will hold grievance hearings at the Town Office from 9:00am to 4:00pm on Friday, June 15th 2012, these hearings will be continued on Saturday, June 16th from 1:00 to 4:00pm.

Any property owner may grieve the listed value of their property. After grievance hearings, we will finalize the Grand List. For this reason, you must notify us of your intent to grieve by the time of hearings on June 15th & 16th, 2012, or you will have to wait until next year.

Remember that you are grieving the listed value of your property, not the tax bill. (That amount will be calculated by the treasurer in August using the tax rate, based on the budgets passed and the final Grand List amount.) We would encourage you to come and talk to us prior to the official hearings so we may be able to answer any questions you may have about how we arrived at the current value of your property. The Lister office has information on sales and comparison sheets for you to review, and these can help you conclude what value your property should be listed for.

The official grievance hearing is much more formal. This is your time to present evidence to us, to show us what you think the listed value should be for your property. After the grievance, we may request a chance to see your property. This will allow us to take a fresh look at the state of your property, so we can consider how we should reflect your concerns in the listed value.

The select board is busy this Spring what with getting through the mud season and getting ready for Summer projects. We know that some areas were hit pretty hard with the fast warm up and warm nights that did not allow the roads to refreeze much. Your patience was appreciated and we are happy to report that we survived another mud season and are now in the grading and fixing mode. Please feel free to contact us with any road issues or questions. Our goals this summer are to work on infrastructure which will include working with the road crew to check drainage and culverts. Please let us know of any concerns so that we can address them.

An ongoing project has been the transfer station and how to trim cost and boost efficiency. We are meeting with Casellas to look at the latest options that are available to us regarding recycling and becoming more efficient and easier for the town.

Recently we were approached regarding a Hazard Mitigation Grant that is applied and run through the Vermont Law school and is designed to explore and mitigate the environmental, economic and social aspects of a disaster. Tunbridge is one of 2 pilot towns (Hartford, VT is the other). This means that Tunbridge demographics will be used in the grant process.

First Branch Ambulance last met with the select board on March 20th. In that meeting we were told to expect a report within a week. We did receive the report on April 17th. A copy of the report is available at the town clerk's office. A meeting will be warned sometime before the end of the fiscal year regarding articles 8 and 9 from the Town meeting.

As this is our first formal communication with the community since our annual meeting in March when the 2012-2013 school budget was approved, we wish to thank you for your continued support. There have been some significant changes over the past few years as we worked towards laying a strong foundation for sustainable local education. We appreciate your vote of confidence in the the process and your continued communication with us, which ensures that adjustments can be made as necessary to ensure the best outcome.

At that March meeting we regretfully announced that after four years of service, Principal Kathie Ball would be leaving us, primarily due to health issues. Directly following this, a ten person committee was formed that consisted of Board members, TCS employees, and community members, with the charge of recommending applicant(s) that they felt would be an appropriate fit for TCS. This process, which included candidate interviews, resulted in three applicants moving forward. Each candidate then spent some time in the school where they enjoyed a student led tour, met some of our faculty and staff, participated in a robust Q&A session with a handful of lucky students and met with Principal Ball. The selection process was further enriched by interviews with Superintendent Bickford and finally the School Board itself.

We are pleased to announce that following this intense process, the position has been offered to (and accepted by!) Richard Talbot. With extensive classroom and administration experience, Rick currently serves as a principal of a large middle school in Maine. There he is known for building a warm and welcoming school atmosphere where there is a culture of respect and high expectations for students and employees alike.

Among other things, Rick will bring with him wide ranging experience in instructional practices and pedagogy, effective communication, curriculum development, conflict resolution and PhiS, standardized testing, budgeting, and employee supervision, evaluation and development. During our conversations Rick came across as a straightforward, student-centered administrator who highly values building a learning community that actively involves parents, teachers and students. This was echoed when he was asked what he wished for people to know about him right away. He responded that he wanted people to know about his open door policy and his willingness to work collaboratively with the goal of providing educational excellence for children. ➡

The first round of Phase III investments closed on April 2. Investment were received from residents of Tunbridge, Chelsea, Strafford, Vershire, Thetford and Norwich. Although the overall phase III investments came in above our goals, the folks who invested in Tunbridge are rather spread out. Work is still under way to figure out the most efficient first route the network can take in Tunbridge with the investments provided.

Another variable at this time is a potential grant we may receive from the VTA to build the network to premises they consider unserved. We have applied for other VTA grants in the past but the situation on both sides has changed allowing us to be optimistic. The decision on this grant is expected to be made in early June. After this time ECFiber will make definite decisions on what roads can be served in this first round.

ECF is offering further opportunities to expand the network thru subsequent closings approximately every 3 months. The next closing is expected to be on or around July 2, 2012, then again on or around October 1.

The checks aren't due until the closing date, but signed commitment letters secured before then will help speed along the pole application and engineering process. All that means- If you think you can invest, please let us know sooner rather than later!

Once the ECFiber network is established in Tunbridge it will be easier to add more routes through raising additional funds at each quarterly closing. The rate of return is very good on ECFiber investments. It's a 15 year term but it does pay well and it does bring this essential service to our town!

State Representative

The legislative session adjourned late on Saturday night, May 5th, after an intense 12 day "race-to-the-finish." We successfully completed our work on all the big money bills - the budget, miscellaneous tax bill, and transportation bill. I'll be sending out an end-of-session report within the next few weeks with more detail about what that means for your pocketbooks and Vermont's economic future. Here's a brief update on bills that many of you have contacted me about:

- River bill - S.202 passed overwhelmingly. The senate used the bill I introduced that fixes some of VT's compliance issues (for the purpose of qualifying for National Flood Insurance Program) and added some Irene-influenced "fixes" to river access during emergencies, updated mapping funded by state for state & town use, and greater training/support for road crews around infrastructure updates. This is a GREAT bill -- very important for Royalton & Tunbridge, and something I'm proud to helped create.

- GMO bill - Voted out of house agriculture at the end of April, but didn't make it out of the judiciary committee before adjournment. There is significant support for this bill, so it's likely to reemerge next year. Concerns about barriers to implementation and law suits from Monsanto have forced a slower process.

- The Fracking Bill - Vermont became the first state in the country to ban fracking (fracturing rock, usually shale) for the purposes of extracting oil and gas. The bill included further study of the environmental and economic impacts of fracking, should there ever be a movement to lift the ban in the future.

- Exemptions to vaccinations for school-aged children: The House version of the bill, maintaining philosophical exemptions, passed. The bill included more education and outreach to help us boost our immunization rates across the state.

- Agency of Education- passed a bill that creates a state agency of education and a secretary of education. GIANT step forward for creating transparency and accountability for education policy in Vermont.

- Prescription Drug Bill: Several bills pass to address substance abuse and treatment issues. The bill related to law enforcement access to the prescription drug database did not pass. More detail on this in my end-of-session report.

First Branch Ambulance & Rescue

There will be a **Special Town Meeting in the school gym on July 11th at 6pm** in regards to the First Branch Ambulance appropriations from Town Meeting.

As residents who attended the recent Town Meeting heard during discussion of the Selectboard's budgets, several allegations of misconduct by First Branch Ambulance and Rescue (FBA&R) had been taken to and discussed by the board.

In response to those allegations the First Branch Board conducted an investigation. On April 17 it emailed its investigation report to the Tunbridge Selectboard.

On May 1 the Selectboard and First Branch board members discussed the report. Selectboard members were satisfied with the report and said they will move forward to schedule a Special Town Meeting to vote on the First Branch appropriation of \$30,000.00 Operating Funds and the \$15,000 toward the purchase of a new ambulance that were tabled in March at Town Meeting. We hope that everyone can come out to the special town meeting to show your support for 1st Branch.

First Branch Ambulance Captain Linda Kuban, the Orange County Sheriff's Department and the First Branch Board's attorney investigated the four complaints. No evidence was found to support three of them.

The four allegations, brought by two individuals, dealt with the ambulance driver texting while on duty, pornography being viewed on the squad's computers at the Chelsea Fire Station, squad members responding with alcohol on their breath and the ambulance not being properly cleaned.

One instance where someone texted while driving was admitted to while the ambulance was stopped at a stop sign while coming back from a transport. The board disciplined the driver by putting a letter in his personnel file and putting him on six-months' probation.

In addition, the board took other actions, including revising the by-laws, which are available to the public, and updating personnel and other policies. FBA&R has notified the Tunbridge and Chelsea Fire Departments that the ambulance and rescue policies call for a drug free, harassment free environment at each station.

Linda Kuban, who served 25 years as captain of the ambulance, is now the unpaid administrator and continues as a first responder. Pam Caron was replaced by the Selectboard in February after 24 years as one of the town's two representatives on the First Branch board. She was board president for many of those years. We thank her and Linda Kuban for their many years of service dedicated to First Branch. ➡

The Selectboard named Bob Sponable as the town's second representative on the board. The other representative, Deb Mullen, is the new board president. Adrian Lakin of Tunbridge is now ambulance captain. Dan Roberts of Tunbridge continues as rescue captain.

The board welcomes residents who would like to help formulate First Branch Ambulance and Rescue 5- and 10-year plans. Volunteers are always welcome as members of the ambulance and rescue squads.
