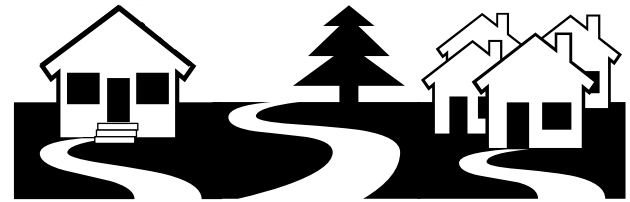

There has been talk at the Town Office about coming up with a Town Logo that we can use on all Tunbridge media materials. It has been decided that we will hold a contest. Tunbridge Ice Skating Rink

Thanks to a generous outpouring from the community, Tunbridge now has a skating rink. The Recreation Commission made a plea for contributions, hoping to raise about \$2,600 to get the rink up and running. The community responded with donations adding up to \$4,774. That does not include the valuable time and effort that was donated by volunteers to help construct and, now, to maintain the rink. The “extra” money will be used to help maintain the rink over time and purchase lights, as the ones being used now are on loan from The Fair Association.

The school now includes skating as one of its electives. The rink is available for community use, weather permitting, after school and on weekends. And it is certainly getting a lot of use. Even if you don't want to get on the ice, it is worth stopping by for a look see: Skaters of all ages, styles and experience having a great time on winter's day.

The Selectmen's budget for the fiscal year 06/07 has no significant changes. To make the process clearer we have eliminated Delinquent taxes as an income item. The same amount was always added to the tax amount to be raised. A new income item is Hold Harmless. This is the amount sent from the state to cover taxes reduced by current use.

Appropriations, an amount to be raised by taxes, has increased. The Fire Dept. is asking for \$30,000.00 to add to their equipment fund in addition to \$25,000 for operating expenses. The Ambulance is asking for \$11,000, the new cemetery wants \$6,000.00 and the town is asking for \$25,000 to finish the water system for the town hall and town office.

There are three big changes in the Highway budget. It includes the addition of a full-time person, and the purchase of a new truck. The additional person adds about \$25,000 to the budget and the truck adds about \$30,000. Also planned is an addition to the garage to store flammable materials. This is estimated to cost about \$11,000.

What does this mean as far as your taxes? They will go up.

This tax rate is based on last year's Grand List. The grand list usually increases each year, which will make the tax rate go down. Also, depending on any surplus funds, the tax rate could go down.

The amount of Delinquent taxes was down this year. Approximately 5.4% went delinquent this year, compared to about 6.7% the two previous years.

The Tunbridge Fair was started in 1867 by The Union Agricultural Society at the Elisha Lougee farm in North Tunbridge. It moved to its present location in 1875. It was christened "a little world's fair" by the former Lt. Gov. Martin of Chelsea.

Tunbridge School Board

The Tunbridge School Board would like to share with the community that we recently completed negotiations with the Tunbridge Teacher's Association. The result is a master contract effective from July 1, 2005 until June 30, 2008. The process of negotiations lasted from October 2004 until January of 2006. After the board established its goals and proposed ground rules for the process we worked with the chief association negotiator, Walt Garner, on extensive language changes to the negotiated agreement. These modifications to existing language clarified and updated many terms of the contract.

In April of 2005 first proposals dealing with money related issues, salary and insurance, were exchanged. As the school year closed and the district transitioned to a new superintendent our negotiations reached a point where neither side had additional monetary offers to share.

Impasse was formally declared in early September. The process of agreeing on a mediator and setting a date for mediation began. Once impasse was declared the board hired Dennis Wells to represent the districts interests throughout the remaining process. In early December the mediation session occurred. Mediator Ira Lobel spent over 5 hours going between both groups. At the end of the session we did not have a formal agreement but had moved closer. After a couple of additional exchanges and clarifications both groups in mid-January approved a new master contract.

The results of this process are a 4% yearly increase in salary with minimal base salary increases. The TCS staff will also increase their percentage of health insurance co-pay by 1% a year.

This past fall Vermont Town Clerks began training to participate in the new state-wide checklist program run by the Secretary of State and the Elections Division. We are all in hopes that the system will be up and running smoothly for the 2006 Primary elections.

Any resident that is not on the voter checklist may register at the clerk's office. You must provide a Vermont Drivers License or other Vermont DMV identification. The deadline to register to vote at the March town & school meetings is noon, **Monday, Feb. 27**. Applications are available at the clerk's office.

On Jan. 11 the Town Moderator and I attended a Town Meeting Tune-up Seminar sponsored by the Vermont League of Cities and Towns (VLCT). Moderators, Clerks, and Select board members from 32 towns attended. Many ideas were shared. The VLCT legal team answered questions.

Transfer Station & Recycling

Several years ago, the CVSWMD board voted to move toward a more regional approach of providing disposal services to communities. The concern is that all communities, regardless of population, receive equitable and expansive services from the CVSWMD. The idea was to build (or add to existing facilities) full-service transfer stations that would accept a wider variety of materials. The facilities would be shared by several towns. Many areas of concern have been explored such as traffic patterns, community disposal habits, etc. Geographically it made sense to group Tunbridge with Chelsea and Strafford.

The CVSWMD has been meeting with the Tunbridge and Chelsea Selectboards over the past year about the future of the CVSWMD support of local transfer stations. Currently the Tunbridge Transfer Station receives financial assistance from CVSWMD for recycling. Additionally, they hold the Tire, Household Hazardous Waste and Electronics collections. They provide technical assistance to us and support in working with the state regarding certification. The Town of Tunbridge has been open to discuss and explore all possibilities and are approaching the prospect with caution. An engineer was hired to look at Tunbridge and Chelsea to determine availability and appropriateness of sites. No decisions have been made and the CVSWMD board has decided to resume the discussions next year.

We were forced to raise disposal fees at the Transfer Station and loose truckloads truckloads are no longer accepted as they strain our compactor and do not necessarily promote recycling:

Tunbridge Board of Listers

The Board of Listers is heading into its busy season. All properties must be listed, as they exist on April 1 of a given year. We may visit a property at any time, but we can only assess for what was there as of April 1. For example: You are in process of construction, and, as of April 1, you do not have any plumbing or electrical work. We visit May 1 and by that time the work is complete. We must assess the property for that tax year as though the plumbing and electrical work is incomplete.

The Lister annual work must be completed by June 4, the last day we may lodge the abstract of the Grand List. The Grand List must set forth the values of all taxable properties listed in alphabetical order by owner's name. On the day we lodge the abstract we are required to send out notices to all property owners whose assessments has changed. The notice must show the amount of change, give a brief explanation, and state the time and date of grievance hearings.

At the first of the year we had approximately 60 more places we expect to visit between January and mid May. This includes new building starts (dwellings or outbuildings), updates of construction that were incomplete as of April 1st last year, and dwellings that have been renovated.

Visiting properties is the easiest part of the job. Assigning a value is the most difficult. We use a computer program that provides the cost of construction. We use that cost and our knowledge of recent sales to make our best guess at what the property would sell for and then compare that value with other similar properties. It is often an exhausting process that finds us debating, researching, and second-guessing ourselves on even a minimal change of assessment.

In addition, each year the State changes slightly the value of property enrolled in the current use program. There are presently 152 properties enrolled in the program. We must review every property for this change and send notices to all enrollees. Under the new laws, the State sends us a list of all properties owners that have filed a homestead. We must review the properties and make sure that all homestead and housesite values are correct.

Tunbridge Church

The Tunbridge Church will be looking forward to its activities to celebrate spring and Easter in the next few months.

Sometime around the beginning of spring, the church holds its annual Sugar-On-Snow gathering. Watch the church board and The Herald for notices of the exact date.

Easter falls on April 16th this year. The church holds a sunrise service after which there is a yummy breakfast at the Town Hall. The time and place of the service will be determined closer to the date. The regular 10 a.m. service on Easter is a joyous festival including music by both choirs.

Lent begins March 1st and the First Choir (youth choir) will offer music for the first Sunday in Lent, March 5th. Palm Sunday is April 9th and the service usually borders on rowdy both choirs singing lots of "Hosannas". The Good Friday service is at 7:30 p.m. April 14th. This service is a candlelight communion service.

The First Choir has expanded its activities. It meets on Tuesdays after school, first at the Parish House for snacks and chat, and then at 4:30 moves to the church for rehearse until 5:45. The choir often takes special trips for concerts or other activities.

The church Parish Council recently held a reorganization meeting. Townsend Swayze was elected a council president. Our church pastor is David Wolfe; music director, Judie Lewis; and First Choir Director, Janet Zug.

The Tunbridge Church is a nondenominational fellowship. Worship services are at 10 a.m. throughout the year.

Additionally, we have received approval from Ron Caron to install a new repeater in his silo on the top of the Strafford Road. The new more powerful repeater will ensure that our volunteers will receive crucial call signals when they are needed to respond to an emergency call. Both the generator and the repeater were made available to our town through grants received from the Department of Homeland Security. We would like to express our thanks to JD Gas, Gordie Benson, Ron Caron and Chapman Foundations for their assistance in working with us on these projects.

Tunbridge Planning Commission

The Planning Commission held a total of seven public meetings this year to gather public input for a town plan rewrite. Themes developed over the course of the sessions which were guided by the Planning Commission's suggestions. Topping the long list were: Maintaining our agricultural heritage, creating affordable housing, discussion of land use issues including zoning, promoting a local economic base including broadband, creating places for community news: bulletin board, town web page, newsletter, providing local daycare, elderly care and services, providing recreation opportunities, supporting emergency services, and creating youth opportunities.

The Planning Commission will now write the town plan with technical assistance from Two Rivers Ottauquechee Regional Planning Commission. There will be opportunities for the public to comment on it. It will then go to the Selectboard for approval. The deadline for the work to be completed is late May.

An Agricultural Survey was conducted by the planning commission and was coordinated by member Dan Rudell. Much valuable baseline information was gathered giving a "state of agriculture" picture across the town. The maps and tabulated information that have been generated from the survey will help inform the town plan in the agriculture and land use sections. There will be a display at Town Meeting of the Ag survey.

We would like to welcome new planning commission members, Ginny Burham, Liz York and Gary Mullen. The Planning Commission meets on the second Tuesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the town offices. The meetings are open to the public.
