The Planning Commission has been busy finalizing its complete overhaul of the Town's Hazard Mitigation Plan with the indispensable help of Peg Elmer, who has been working through a FEMA grant. Tunbridge's revision, including the process used, will serve as a template for other smaller towns in Vermont (Peg has worked with Hartford in a similar capacity to develop a template for larger municipalities). The Selectboard has formally adopted the plan and forwarded it to both FEMA and Vermont Emergency Management as required by state and federal law. This will ensure the Town's eligibility for various disaster relief and mitigation programs. Thank you to all the many people who participated in the process and showed up to our potlucks lo' these many months!

The Planning Commission is also in the process of finalizing a long overdue update of the Floodplain Ordinance, which is required if townspeople are to remain eligible for federal flood insurance. Please be on the lookout for announcements of public meetings and delicious potlucks as we conclude this process. The Planning Commission is required by state law to have finished the update by July 1, 2014. Tempus fugit!

Finally, the Planning Commission announces the official establishment of both the Town Forest Committee and the Town Agriculture Committee. Numerous individuals have shown interest in serving on these committees, and we encourage you to step forward now. Those interested should contact Gary Mullen by phone at 889-3323.

If there are other land use matters that you think the Planning Commission should address, please contact any member with your concerns!

The select board has been busy finishing up working with the outside auditors, the Emergency Services Committee, the Planning Commission, and working on the budget.

As the board ends its work with the outside auditing firm, Beesaw & Associates we begin preparing for the next audit. After the next audit we will then be on a scheduled cycle, not annual.

Bob Dunkle has been working on the concept of a "Farmer's Contract" for the dairy farmers in town and will be talking with the Planning Commission in November.

In addition we respect tax payer's concerns about how the town's money is spent, especially on the heels of a noticeable increase in our taxes. So we just want clarify, for those who had concerns and questions during the fair, that the time and materials used by the road crew to help the fair out during one of our many rainstorms of the season was paid in full by the Fair Association.

We thank all that helped with keeping the fair going during a very soggy year.

ECFiber

East-Central Vermont Community Fiber-Optic Network

ECFiber is a telecommunications effort owned and governed by 24 central Vermont towns and operated by Valley Net. The ultimate goal is to provide high-speed Internet via fiber-optic cable to every home and business in all 24 towns. Funding for this project is being raised in the form of investments. Thus far, ECFiber has strung over 160 miles of cable passing 2100 potential customers. Currently there are 480 customers which means right now the fiber build is ahead of subscriptions.

In an effort to speed up the process of hooking up subscribers, volunteers will be going door to door on each route that has been built or is on the current list to be built. These volunteers will be talking to home and business owners about the options for service as well doing an initial survey of what it will take to bring the line to their premises. This is an actual fiber-optic cable that needs to be connected to the building for service, usually in the same fashion as an electric line.

A "standard drop" is an aerial line from the pole that is 400' or less. The installation charge for this is \$75. for homes and \$150. for businesses. The actual cost for the simplest installation is over \$2000. Please remember that ECFiber is not a big business like Fairpoint or Comcast. There are no deep coffers of funds to draw from, so offering free installation or low introductory offers is not an option. What ECFiber does offer is the best connection possible, often to folks who have no other viable options, and an opportunity to support your community by subscribing &/or investing.

For premises that are further than 400' from the main line or that require underground cabling, the customer will be asked to pay the excess amount above the standard connection cost. The work can be performed by ECF, folks can do it themselves, or hire an outside contractor.

In Tunbridge service is currently available on Button Hill extending into Strafford via Potash and Kibling Hill Roads. Also on the the list to be built next is a run from Moxley Road on Rt110, up Chelsea Mtn Road, down Dickerman Hill to Whitney Hill. If you are on these routes, or think you may be, please goto www.ecfiber.net to subscribe or call the office at 763-2262. This will indicate that you want the service and start the process, someone from the ECFOffice will contact you about getting connected.

If you are just off of any of these routes, it may be simple to get it to you sooner than later. Contact your ECF delegates (info above) and see what can be done.

Tunbridge Volunteer Fire Department

For the 5th year in a row, Fire Department members went to the Tunbridge Central School in October to provide fire safety education to students in recognition of Fire Prevention month. The students viewed a fire safety video and learned about the importance of planning escape routes and designating safe meeting places outside of their house in the event of a fire. If you have not already done so, run through an evacuation drill at home and talk to your kids about alternate exits in the event of a fire at home.

Thank you to all who volunteered to help out at the coin drop fundraiser during the fair. The coin drop is our biggest fundraiser each year and it serves a critical role in the replacement and upkeep of various pieces of equipment. This year we ran into some new regulations that required us to spend \$2,500 on new signage for the coin drop. These signs can be used year after year, but the unexpected cost cut into the amount of funds we were able to put towards equipment replacement this year.

We have recently formed a subcommittee to look at the structural changes we will need to make as we expand our department to include rescue services. This will include updates to our operating guidelines, by laws and defining a specific training plan for rescue members. If you are interested in learning more about membership on either the fire or rescue squads, please feel free to stop by the firehouse at one of our business meetings on the second Thursday each month at 7:00pm.

There will be a first responder class starting in South Roy-alton in December. Watch for advertisements if you have an interest in enrolling. Also, be on the lookout for more information on VT Alert. This new program allows homeowners to go on line & register with VT Alert to receive information during disasters or other major events.

Visit us on Facebook under “Tunbridge Volunteer Fire Department” for communication during disasters response. Don’t forget to contact our Fire Warden Brenda Field at 889-5548 for a fire permit if you plan to burn brush. A permit is required to burn brush at your home.

Daylight savings time has just past us by again. Remember to change the batteries in your smoke detectors and have your chimney cleaned. These regular maintenance activities can help to ensure you and yours have a safe holiday season and winter ahead.

State Representative

Although state legislators aren’t paid after the legislative session adjourns, many of us spend considerable time working on emerging, complex, or ongoing policy issues during the summer and fall. Like many of my colleagues, I’ve been spending a lot of time collaborating with department and agency leaders, non-profit partners, and private sector stakeholders about issues important to our state and region.

Earlier this fall, I was honored with a “Pacesetter Award” from a national women’s group in Washington, DC. Shortly after, an economic policy group invited me to Philadelphia to participate in a forum on funding for higher education. Finally, I’ve been deeply involved in examining Vermont’s early childhood support system by participating in a series of focus groups, task force meetings, and ultimately a statewide summit on October 29th.

Vermont Health Connect, our version of the federally mandated online marketplace for purchasing health care insurance (“the exchange”), is significantly more developed than exchange systems in other states. Still, it’s clear that the technological backbone that supports smooth functioning isn’t where the administration hoped it would be by now. The legislature included a provision in our enabling legislation that permits time extensions if certain benchmarks weren’t met. These include (1) defining essential health benefits, (2) designing the plans, (3) completing the rating process with insurance companies, and (4) ensuring that the IT system is up and running. Unlike New Hampshire, for example, we’ve progressed through most of the steps right on time. But since the IT system is not functioning satisfactorily, the Governor is invoking the power to delay so that no Vermonter experiences a lapse in coverage because of technical failures. In short, this means that Vermonters who would otherwise have had to begin purchasing health insurance through the exchange by January 1, 2014, may now continue to buy their insurance as they normally have until April 1, 2014. There is bipartisan approval for the Governor’s action. I’ll host a community information event on health care later this fall - with navigators on hand to answer your individual questions. Stay tuned for dates.

Once again we provided EMS coverage during the fair. This is always a busy time for our crew as well as the volunteers that help us in our fundraising booth. Heather Mullen organizes this event annually and we thank her for all of her hard work.

There will be a Emergency Medical Responder course starting in December. It will be held at the Tunbridge Fire Station on Tuesdays and Thursdays. We are working with the Emergency Services Committee to provide them with our 5 year plan.

We are working with Gifford Hospital and South Royalton Rescue in the SAVE program. This is a program that will help cut costs for ambulance and rescue services with purchasing medical supplies and trainings among other things.

We are working on a new program with the Chelsea Health Center to provide home visits to citizens of Tunbridge and Chelsea. These visits can be to check vitals, dressings, medications and more. This is a new and exciting way to provide services to our elderly residents as well as other members of the community that are in the need of limited medical assistance in between doctors visits. Tunbridge Central School teachers have done an incredible job incorporating agriculture into the curriculum this fall.

Here are some highlights from the classrooms:

- Each grade prepared a delicious, locally inspired dish for the Taste of Tunbridge potluck. Apple fritters, pickles, tomato sauce, quiche, salad with maple vinaigrette, vegetable soup, roasted potatoes, and more...
- 1st graders harvested many different vegetables from their new garden plot, outside the library.
- Middle school students harvested 120 pounds of potatoes from their new garden plot, also outside the library.
- Grades 2, 3, and 4 returned to the Chapman farm to harvest pumpkins planted in the fall and learn more about the affect of weather on crop production.
- Grade 4 harvested apples in the VTC orchard for the Tunbridge Fair cider pressing.
- Middle school students studied and sketched old-fashioned tools on Antique Hill at the Fair.
- 1st graders studied the life cycle of a pumpkin plant, illustrated their own pumpkin books, and celebrated by making pumpkin ice cream.
- Amy Bogardus took a team of students to the Jr. Iron Chef competition in Sharon. They made Loaded Garlic Potatoes and Spinach Feta Chicken Quesadillas. Congratulations!

Exciting things are happening in the cafeteria as well:

- Locally purchased ingredients for the Hot Lunch program include maple syrup from the Bogardus family, carrots and radishes from Wes Mattern, Vermont Farmstead cheese, pork from Back Beyond Farm, and salad greens and lettuce from Tunbridge Hill Farm.
- The monthly taste tests have been really fun! Students have enjoyed sampling different varieties of Vermont apples, Vermont Farmstead Cheddar Cheese, and pumpkin cookies. Past taste-tests of scalloped potatoes and broccoli cheddar soup will be on the November menu, along with homemade beef stew with local beef.
- Big thanks to Kevin Moran for purchasing and installing a new salad bar. Every day, students create their own tasty salads. As a result, there is less food waste and more salad eating at TCS.
