The selectboard has met several times since Town Meeting. We have elected Gary Mullen chair, Ingrid Van Steamburg vice chair, and Erin Gooch clerk. We have enjoyed getting to know one another, and are confident that we will work well together.

The board has begun to give thought to how to best plan its work over the coming year. We would like to spend some time together developing our vision for the board and the town, and better understanding how this vision will inform our work. We hope to report back to you on this work in the next TQ.

We have begun reviewing our existing town policies and procedures to identify gaps: what needs to be updated, and what does not yet exist at all. One of our first projects is to update the responsibilities of and expectations for town committees. Committee members, please be on the lookout for this work, and please be prepared to provide us with feedback.

One theme we plan to emphasize over the coming year is communication. We will continue to develop mechanisms that will make it easier for residents to understand the work the board is doing. We are considering a few options for visually displaying our current and upcoming work. Using a visual management tool is a way of tracking our work publicly, so that both board members and residents have a current snapshot view of our work pipeline: what we have in our queue, what we're working on at the moment, and what we've accomplished.

It was great to see so many parents and community members at our April meeting. Some came to discuss an issue, others simply to listen and learn more about the goings-on at the school and OWSU level. We want the community to feel welcome at our meetings - held the third Monday of the month at 6 PM in the School library -- and also to be able to understand and support the work of the school board. But not everyone has time to attend yet another evening meeting! This is not the easiest system to navigate currently but we do anticipate positive changes happening soon as OWSU has recently contracted with Barn Door Media in Chelsea to provide a complete update and overhaul of the websites.

## **State Representative**

With only a week left of the legislative session, we are working late nights and early mornings. By the time this edition lands in your mailbox, we will have adjourned for the session (hopefully!). The bills that are gaining the most attention are the budget, tax bill, and education governance bill. I'm watching each very closely and can't predict how I'll vote at this moment because it depends on what the "compromise" proposals will be. For example, the House version of the tax bill eliminated small school grants (which I opposed) but only raised the education tax rate \$.04 (rather than the \$.07 recommended by the tax commissioner). The Senate version appears to raise the tax \$.06 and does not have the elimination of small school grants -- as of this writing. The Budget bills are somewhat closer in final recommendation, the major difference being that the Senate's version recommends that we increase the Medicaid reimbursement rate to health care providers by 2% (I support) instead of the House recommend of (.75% -- better than nothing!). I support the higher amount because it assures health care providers who are nervous about the legislature's future action re: health care reform that we understand that true "reform" won't be successful if we don't continue to support the doctors, nurses, and other professionals who make our excellent care possible. We can't be one-sided about health care delivery policies because affordable, quality, accessible care is just too important. Finally, changes to education governance have become a pressing priority of the Governor and leaders of both chambers. The House version is so different from the Senate's that a compromise will likely result in some (currently unknown) structure. Under both proposals, however, the implementation date is years away (plenty of time for revision next session!). See you at the Memorial Day Parade!

Did you know that \$1.7 million worth of property in Tunbridge is insured through the federal flood insurance program? Did you know that there are programs to help people elevate structures that may be threatened by floodwaters? Federal and state programs such as these depend on Tunbridge having up-to-date ordinances governing building in the floodplain, and the state would like to see something similar for fluvial erosion zones. The Planning Commission will be doing its final review and update of the Town's floodplain by-laws at its June meeting; Tuesday, June 10, at 6:30 pm in the Town Offices -- to meet our July 1st deadline. Please join us if you are interested!

In other matters, thank you for the great turn-out for our first Dairy Farmers' Contract potluck. Please look for information regarding a second potluck early this summer. **IMPORTANT REMINDER:** Filing Homestead Declarations annually became mandatory in 2013. If you are a Vermont resident and own and occupy a Vermont dwelling as your principle residence on April 1, 2014, you must file a Homestead Declaration, form HS-122. The Homestead Declaration must be filed even after the due date (April 15 each year). The declaration is necessary so that your property is charged the residential tax rate, and is a prerequisite to a property tax adjustment.

Spring is underway and we are entering our busiest time of the year. We will be lodging the 2014 Grand List soon, which means looking at any new properties and/or additions or out-buildings that we see as we ride around town. With no zoning or permit system in place, it's the only way to spot new construction.

The Listers have set grievance day for Friday, June 20, 2014 from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM. If your property value has changed from the previous 2013 Grand List you will be sent a Change of Appraisal Notice. If your property value has not changed, you will not receive a formal notice, unless you requested one. However, any property owner may grieve the value that the Listers have given their property.

Following the notices we send, we encourage you to come in before the official grievance day to discuss your value. On the actual grievance day we are a listening body only. You will need to present evidence to show why the property is not listed at a probable selling price. We would be happy to show you the information we have available to help you in preparing a case.

The first step in grieving is coming to us, the Listers, to make your case. If you are not satisfied with the results you may go before the BCA, which is the Board of Civil Authority, and consists of a quorum of the following people: the three selectboard members, the town clerk, and the seven Justices of the Peace. Following their decision on the matter, you may continue (if still not satisfied) to the State Appraiser or to Superior Court.

As always, thank you for your patience and support as we take on the delicate task of assessing the properties in town at their fair market value. If you have any questions or concerns feel free to call, email or stop by the office. We are generally in the Town Office on Tuesdays and Fridays from 9am-3pm.

Farmer Interviews: 5th grade students have started to interview Tunbridge farmers to learn about growing food and life as a farmer. The interviews will be paired with photographs and will be on display later in the year.
