The fiscal year ends on June 30th. As of now the budgets look like they will be close. Hopefully nothing major happens in the next couple months. If the budgets come in on target there won't be a surplus to reduce the amount of taxes needed for the next fiscal year. Using the Grand List as of April 25, 2006, the tax rate for the town will be approximately \$.63. Last year it was \$.51. This will be an increase of \$120.00 per \$100,000.00 of property value. The estimated school Homestead tax rate is \$1.402, up from \$1.2809 last year. (An increase of \$.12) This would also be an increase of \$120.00 per \$100,000.00 of value. Tax bills will be sent out in mid to late July. Payments can be made at anytime and applied to your account.

Remember to file your HS-131 by July 15th. If you don't file by July 15th you will be taxed at the non-residential education rate and won't be eligible for the state prebate or rebate.

Tunbridge Broadband Project

The Tunbridge Broadband Committee has gathered surveys to determine how many residents and business owners in Tunbridge would be likely to subscribe to high-speed Internet service if it were available to them. After three months, the survey is now closed, and we are encouraged by the 160 responses.

We are talking with our neighboring towns to inform each other about our similar efforts. Town lines mean little when creating service areas; the hilltops and valleys determine the design of wireless networks. Working together in some capacity may benefit individual towns and the region as a whole.

Our next step is to examine broadband provider options and determine if one is well-suited to build a network in Tunbridge. We will also explore the possibility of making this a community-owned network, as some other towns in Vermont have done successfully. We will work to choose a system that provides good service and decent prices, along with the widest possible coverage.

The entire project will take time, but we are confident that high speed Internet service is on its way to Tunbridge. In the meantime, the Library is working on getting faster service through cable or DSL and hopes to have it available around the end of the year.

The NeighborWorks® Homeownership Center at Central Vermont Community Land Trust (CVCLT), is pleased to announce a \$375,000 grant from the Vermont Community Development Program, obtained through a partnership with Lake Champlain Housing Development Corporation, Lamoille Housing Partnership and the towns of Northfield, Bradford and Morristown. These funds will be used to create the Green Mountain Loan Fund, which will allow low and moderate income homeowners throughout Washington, Lamoille and Orange Counties to perform critical health and safety upgrades; such as weatherization, lead abatement, and access modification. CVCLT staff will work closely with interested parties to determine eligibility and with borrowers to determine a scope of work, obtain bids and monitor rehabilitation-related construction, while also providing affordable loan capital to pay for the work.

Transfer Station & Recycling

Saturdays 9-3

The Tunbridge Transfer Station is open every Saturday from 9:00 - 3:00. Leaving ANY items off at the facility when the facility is closed is considered illegal dumping (even if recyclable).

Someone dumped several mattresses in the Town Garage burn pile. The mattresses were red. If this sounds familiar to you, please let the Town Clerk know or call me at 685-3035. The town crew had to use their time to load and deliver them to the Bethel/Royalton facility. This cost the Town of Tunbridge a considerable amount of money. The burn pile is not for public use, and any leaving off of materials there is considered dumping.

On a lighter note, the following is taken from the Central Vermont Solid Waste Management District website (www.cvswwmd.org) Check out the website for more information. It is extremely informative and very accessible.

Resident Services: CVSWMD provides leadership, education, and services for residents and businesses in reducing and managing their solid waste in order to protect public health and the environment to the greatest extent feasible. Resident Services include all of the opportunities the District provides for residents to reduce, reuse, recycle, and safely manage their solid waste.

Some Materials MUST be Recycled: It's important to note that there are some items that must be recycled in both homes and businesses, according to the CVSWMD Mandatory Recycling Ordinance. The District's Mandatory Recycling Ordinance 94-01 (effective 10/1/95) was passed to address items that make up a particularly large volume of the recyclable materials entering the wastestream. The ordinance requires businesses (which includes schools and municipal

facilities) to recycle the following materials:

- * White office paper
- * Tin and aluminum cans
- * Clear glass bottles and jars
- * #2 HDPE plastic milk, water and cider jugs
- * Newspaper
- * Cardboard

All solid waste haulers are required to accept the mandatory recyclable items.

Tunbridge Board of Listers

The Board of Listers has scheduled its grievance hearings for **10 a.m. Tuesday, June 13** at the Town Office. Any property owner may grieve the assessed value at that time. Formal notices are sent to only those whose property has changed value for this tax year. At this writing the board expects to send 123 notices of value change. (These changes increased the Grand List by \$3.35 million.) The notices will be sent by May 29.

The assessment and grievance process is strictly set forth in the Vermont State Statutes. If you expect to grieve your assessment, you must notify the Listers of your intent in writing. The town's assessment must represent the property's probable selling price. We reappraised in 2002, so all properties are to be assessed at 2002 values. In other words, we cannot assess a property to reflect the 2005 selling price when all others are at 2002 values. If you do not think that your property assessment reflects the probable 2002 selling price, then you should grieve the value. You must be prepared to present evidence demonstrating that your property is not assessed at the 2002 selling price. We have sales information in our office and spread sheets of assessments for easier comparison of similar properties. You are invited to use these if you are unsure whether the assessment is equitable or if you need assistance in finding comparables.

If you question your property's assessment, you must do so at the grievance hearing to preserve your options. Once the hearings are closed, the Listers must send notice of our decision within seven days. We then lodge the Grand List, which means we turn it over to the town clerk. After the Grand List is lodged, the Listers cannot make any changes. Changes may be made only by the Selectboard or the Board of Abatement and then only under specific circumstances, such as a fire which destroyed the property.

In addition to the change-of-value notices, the board is required to send notices to the 158 current use program enrollees. Every year there is a small change in the use value set by the state, which changes the enrollees Grand List value. More often than not this change represents less than a \$1 difference in the enrollee's tax bill.
