

Tunbridge Select Board

Budgeting season is upon us. As we go over the numbers for the General Fund and Highway Fund, we aim for something close to a level -funded budget. Property taxes are high enough. That said, we must also do right by our town buildings, town roads, and town employees. If the 2017/'18 Selectboard budget exceeds last year's budget, it's because we must balance frugality with being good stewards of our municipal infrastructure and a fair employer of our hardworking employees. We encourage residents to comb through the Town Report. We invite Tunbridgians to attend Town Meeting and ask us questions about why we spent monies the way we did. We go over every line item in the budget. We should have a reasonable and transparent answer for every increase, every decrease or every level-funded expenditure. If we are found to be a tad extravagant or, detrimentally stingy, we should be shown the door by that boot of democracy: the ballot.

Speaking of our town buildings, Randall S. Hoyt was awarded the bid to do much-needed repair work to the outside of the Town Hall. When Randy is done with that phase, painting is next on the agenda (planned for next summer). But before any carpentry can commence, we learned that State regulations require us to do an asbestos test on affected areas. If asbestos is found, asbestos abatement must follow. Asbestos abatement is prohibitively expensive—let's keep our fingers crossed that the test comes up negative.

Before the snow flies, Black Ox Roofing is expected to install a new roof on the Town Garage (on the Transfer Station side only). While the snow has already flown plenty, that expression would be more accurate if it was "before the snow sticks." I remember Roger Hill (meteorologist for WDEV), once saying that, on average, in Central Vermont, the snow starts to stick—because the ground is frozen--around Pearl Harbor Day. That first week of December, give or take a week, should also be about the time the Road Crew switches from their summer schedule (four 10 hour days) back to their winter schedule (five days a week and on call 24/7).

This fall, the Road Crew has been busy ditching, replacing dysfunctional culverts, and brush hogging the ever-encroaching shrubbery along the sides of the town roads. Way back, the first sharp curve up the Strafford Road was known as Sand Hill. This should not be confused with the Hill of Sand that the Road Crew has ready near the Town Garage to combat the upcoming five months of freezing rain, mixed precipitation or—a word from my childhood, now rarely used--sleet.

At the October 17th Selectboard meeting, board members of the First Branch Ambulance (FBA) presented the Selectboard with a draft contract for emergency services. Remarkably, there has never been a contract between FBA and the Town of Tunbridge. Both sides are amenable to having annual expectations and compensation in written form; details should be worked out by the end of the calendar year. FBA also gave the Selectboard a tour of their brand new ambulance, equipped with a powerlift for gurneys and extra seating for a family member to accompany a patient. It's like a little hospital with four-wheel drive.

Finally, the Selectboard purchased two new heavy-duty sandwich boards with extra letters. The old sandwich boards seemed to spend half their days blown over and the available letters had dwindled down to something out of Wheel of Fortune.

Your ECFiber doings

New fiber was just lit from Dickerman on Chelsea Mountain Road over to Monarch Hill, as far as the Spring Road.

The Tunbridge Central School together with the Orange-Windsor supervisory district office has applied for a grant to build a link from the school to the Chelsea ECF hub. This will allow the learning process to tap into the educational programs only available on line. The hope is that this United States Government funding will come and be in time for ECF service to be in place for the start of next school year. These grants are not usually supplied for infrastructure but we are in hopes it will be approved. Last years town's presubscription drive to build the entire town out all at once was missed by 27 pre subscriptions. Had we done this the school would be getting connected for sure.

There will be another crowd funding presubscription drive this year and signing up now will put us ahead of the game. You can go the ECFiber website or call the office 763-2262.

Additional \$s from the state to take internet to unserved spots will be made and ECF will bid for routes in their territory including roads in Tunbridge. Remember this is superior quality service, owned by our towns for our towns. We are not shipping our \$s and jobs out of state and once the system is fully built revenues can be returned to our towns or used to reduce rates or both.

What to report? Your board has been so busy attending multiple meetings a week that we do not have the energy to bore you with a long-winded update! So here's to short and sweet:

The Act 46 slog continues. We are currently studying options that maintain choice for high school and that try to preserve the greatest degree of local democracy possible, per your feedback at our spring forums and through last year's survey. FYI: Tunbridge is currently a voting member of the "PK-8 Study Committee" for purposes of finding the meetings on the calendar. That group generally meets the first and third Monday of each month at the Supervisory Union offices. Anyone is welcome.

We are also entering budgeting season. This work is spearheaded by our fearless leader, Principal Farnsworth, and our SU Business Manager. We welcome your thoughts on what our priorities should be as the budget takes shape over the next few weeks and months. As always we are motivated to make the most of educational opportunities for our students, while keeping a careful eye on the year-on-year change to the overall budget and tax rate. We like to hear townspeople's thoughts on where we should be flexible in spending and where we should be uncompromising!

As many of you may have read in the papers, your district, like many in Vermont, is also headed into another round of collective bargaining with our faculty, and also separately with our support staff. These negotiations will have budget implications both in the near term and in the future. If you are curious about this process because of what you have been hearing on the news, please reach out to any one of us and we will do our best to explain the process.

TCS has recently held its annual Taste of Tunbridge, celebrating and supporting our Farm-to-School program (thank you to Jen Thygesen for her tireless efforts sustaining this great program for our kids!). And TCS's School Club just held its annual Chicken Pie Supper, which raises funds for amazing enrichment opportunities for our K-8 students (thank you to teacher, parent, and event leader Amy Bogardus, and to all the intrepid volunteers, for making this great event happen!). We hope that you had the opportunity to attend one of these events, not only for the amazing food available, but to also check out just how great the school is looking inside and out!

Last, but not least, we are very proud and excited about the Pre-Kindgergarten program serving our district, along with Chelsea, run through the Orange County Parent-Child Center here in Tunbridge. We now have a combined meeting with the Chelsea School Board on the second Wednesday of each month, at 6:30 pm. The location alternates between the two towns' schools. In December we will be back in Tunbridge. The Board can also add meetings on an as-needed basis, which often occurs as budget deadlines approach. Again, the SU calendar is a good place tocheck, as our school website is still under construction. Thank you for everyone's interest in educational matters, and for the wonderful support that you all give to the school, with special thanks to all the local volunteers who chip in to create so many great experiences for our kids, whether it's visits from the TVFD for fire safety education or reading one-on-one week in and week out to our students! There are too many ways to list that the adults of this area give to our kids. We are very grateful for that.

Grievances are done for this year and we have reviewed and submitted information for the annual statewide sales equalization study. We review all sales in town over the last year and assure that sales accounted in the statewide study are "arms-length", with no qualifying factors (such as tax sales, or sales without market exposure, e.g., to family members or neighbors). There were 17 of these "valid" sales in Tunbridge this year. As property in town and ensure that the costs of living and working here are borne as equitably as possible across the town and across the state. Ask yourself, "what do I think I could sell my property for on the open market?" Listed values often do not reflect fair market value. This is because real estate markets are always changing and because reappraisals are not conducted annually. In order to treat all municipalities fairly throughout the state, grand lists are evaluated and adjusted annually to bring each municipality's grand list to fair market value. The adjustment is made through the equalization study." The equalization adjustment is based on the Common Level of Appraisal (CLA) determined by the sales study. Our last town-wide reappraisal was in 2010, and our CLA has crept up each year since (101.79%, 102.75%, 106.04%, 111.95%, 114.93%). We are mandated to do a town-wide reappraisal if our CLA drops below 80% or our Coefficient of Dispersion (COD, a measure of equity within the town) exceeds 20%. Our COD last year was 13.03%, also determined on the basis of the sales study. This year's CLA will be announced near the end of January 2017.

We are still working on late Homestead Declarations and Property Tax Adjustment requests. Although the deadline for late filing has been extended by the legislature to October 15, late Property Tax Adjustments (credited as "STATE PAYMENT" on eligible tax bills) will not come in till November 1 - which is when taxes are due. After November 1, penalties and interest will be added. It is in your best interest to file your Homestead Declaration and Property Tax Adjustment by April 15 (the actual due date) so the town receives the state payment in a timely fashion.

For quarterly rotation this year we are focusing on the southwest corner of town and have sent out notices that we hope to be doing brief exterior inspections and updating our photos of properties in that portion of town. Since Tunbridge doesn't have a permitting process, this is our primary option for tracking changes to properties.

Tunbridge Volunteer Fire Department

As you probably know, each year during the Fair, the Fire Department runs a coin drop on Rte. 110 both North and South of the fairgrounds. This year's coin drop raised just over \$12,000. We rely on the funds raised at this coin drop as a part of our annual fundraising and to cover expenses associated with operating a volunteer fire department. On the days when we are running the coin drop, we also must have several members of our department on the grounds at all times during the fair. We have very few non-TVFD members who help out with the coin drop, and as such, we are in dire need of additional volunteers to help staff the annual coin drop. Without additional volunteers to help staff it, we may needs to reduce the size or it, or eliminate it altogether. If we don't run the coin drop, then the town risks the Fire Department needing to add the value of the coin drop donations to the town appropriation. The hours of noon – 6pm is the hardest time to staff the coin drop. If you are able to volunteer for a 2 hour, 4 hour or even a 6 hour slot, please contact us & we can add you to the schedule next year.

For the 8th year in a row, Fire Department members went to the Tunbridge Central School in October to provide fire safety education to students in recognition of Fire Prevention month. Educational materials were distributed to students as well as providing instruction of what to do if you are caught in a fire. Students had an opportunity to practice evacuating a (simulated) burning building in the event of a real fire.

Daylight savings time has just past us by again. Remember to change the batteries in your smoke detectors and have your chimney cleaned. These regular maintenance activities can help to ensure you and yours have a safe holiday season and winter ahead.

Remember to contact our Fire Warden Brenda Field at 889 5548 for a fire permit if you plan to burn brush. If you are interested in learning more about membership on either the fire or rescue squads, please feel free to stop by the firehouse at one of our business meetings. Meetings are typically held on the second Thursday each month at 7:00pm, however for the remainder of the winter, we may need to move the meeting date while we our Fire Fighter One class is running in the station at that same time. You can contact Fire Chief John Durkee, or Secretary Jena Young for an exact time if you wish to attend.

A group of concerned citizens from the towns of Tunbridge, Royalton, StraffoAlliance for Vermont Communities held a the successful event on the South Royalton Green in late September. Our purpose was to announce the formation of AVC and to invite all those concerned about NewVistas to join with us. Importantly, our fledgling group was joined that day by two strong Vermont organizations; the Vermont Natural Resources Council and the Preservation Trust of Vermont.

Our mission statement looks beyond blocking NewVistas to a better future for the region: "We seek to protect working farms, forests and communities of central Vermont and to promote responsible development that will sustain the rural heritage and values for present and future generations."

NewVistas Foundation's purchases to date are somewhere in the 1400-1600 acres range and are continuing. This is of course a primary concern to us. Our goal is to send a strong message to NewVistas Foundation that we do not want this out-of-scale, top-down project here, or anywhere in VT, and hope to discourage the development plans and future land purchases.

Our activities to date include the production of lawn signs, buttons, and bumper stickers with thanks to Janet Zug. The posting of signs has had an electrifying effect in particular neighborhoods near the center of New Vista land purchases. People have found strength in the numbers of neighbors opposing the project. The AVC website has been retooled as an information resource and includes a portal to make donations from the site. See www.alliancevermont.org. We're producing materials and maps to help inform and educate people in the immediate area as well as the entire state.

We have attended and made presentations at many meetings of public committees, such as the planning and conservation commissions and select boards of the four towns. And we have spent much time engaging elected representatives and political leaders (and candidates) and are very pleased with the strong support we have received from them.
