The Select Board has good news concerning the outcome of the mold eradication projects in the Town Office Building and Town Hall. VLCT which carries our insurance coverage stated early on that they may cover the mold removal in the town hall only due to the fact it was a water pipe leak; the Town Office water was from natural causes and would not be covered. After much paperwork and phone conversations between Wendy and VLCT, the Town of Tunbridge was awarded full coverage for both buildings in the amount of \$59,147.00.

We are still in litigation with Advance Basement Technologies for balance owed to them in the amount of \$5,775.00.

The Road Crew are currently using Bio-Diesel in the one-ton truck, truck #2 and the tractor. Rodney has reported they have had no problems with the product and will be using it in other equipment as the summer progresses.

James Ludwig is our new representative for Tunbridge on the Central Vermont Solid Waste Management District Board, Thank you Jim.

Our Fire Warden, Brenda Field and Fire Chief, John Durkee are working on the new Fire Ordinance; Brenda is working in conjunction with the State of Vermont and should have a draft to the Select Board soon.

We have also received a grant in the amount of \$142,800.00 to pave one mile of Strafford Road and shim from Recreation Road to Route 110. Pike Paving as been contracted to do the paving; the estimated cost to the Town is \$4,000.00.

We are also working with Pike on an estimate to pave the Town Office and Church parking areas.

While it is hard to think about winter sports when it's almost 90 degrees out, please remember: if you're looking for equipment, many clearance sales happen before the season begins! Henderson's (on rt. 4 in Quechee) begins the season with a Labor Day tent sale. Also on Labor Day Weekend is a region-wide Peter Glenn sale event at the Bolton Valley sport center (there is a Peter Glenn store on the Barre-Montpelier road which will have a smaller sales event of its own in Mid-October). The Killington Ski Club and the Ford Sayre program in Hanover sponsor sales closer to the beginning of the season, as does the Suicide Six Ski Runners program. Thygessen's Sports in Barre usually has a pretty good selection of used skates as well as new equipment. Hopefully our winter sports season will get off to an earlier start this year and we'll see more of each other on skates, skis, and snowshoes!

Tunbridge Broadband Project con't

Fiber optic cable carries telephone, TV and internet service. It is the fastest and most reliable solution for internet service. It is not a technology that will go out of style in the foreseeable future and it does not require towers to create the network. The cable runs mostly on existing telephone poles and would be run in to every home in Tunbridge that wants the service.

The city of Burlington created a non-profit company called Burlington Telecom (BT). The company has been privately financed using the town's bond rating as collateral. Once the infrastructure has been paid off with monthly fees, the profit will go back into the town as revenue. In its fourth year BT projects that it will start to put revenue into the city's general fund. BT's goal is to provide service to all Burlington residents by 2008. Part of the infrastructure they needed to build is a hub where all the fiber comes together and telephone, TV and Broadband services are connected. They have room for 100,000 customers. This hub is under-utilized by BT and they are looking to expand into other towns in an effort to help all of Vermont get connected. Check out BT's website for more info at www.burlingtontelecom.net

While we know that fiber optic technology provides superior performance results for internet, telephone and television usage, we realize that there are many questions to be answered as we explore this newly emerging opportunity. Members of the Tunbridge Broadband committee have become part of a regional effort, temporarily named the East-Central Vermont Fiber Network, including ourselves and 14 other neighboring towns. The purpose of this group is primarily to explore the feasibility and advisability of bringing a fiber optic opportunity to our towns. Additionally, joining other towns in our area will be necessary in order to achieve the minimum number of households (12 per mile) to start the project.

The East-Central Committee's, first task is to determine the cost of installing the network. The group has split into sub-committees and the finance committee is working on that now. The communication committee is working to talk with each town's selectboard to inform them of the logistics of the FTTH project and ask for help in bringing the idea to the towns people.

Within this regional group we still have Tunbridge's interests at the top of our list. Our goal is to bring quality high-speed internet service to our hills in a way that offers the best service with the least visible impact at a good price.

Greetings from your Volunteer Fire Department! Thank you to all of you who supported the Department at our Chicken Barbeque fundraiser on Memorial Day. With your support we raised just over \$2000 for our equipment fund.

As we just wrapped up our fiscal year at the end of June, we responded to a total of 24 calls in Tunbridge and the surrounding areas. Structure fires were the cause of 3 calls, while chimney and wild land fires each resulted in 2 calls. Motor vehicle accidents were the reason for 6 calls and our neighboring towns called us in 5 times for mutual aid. The final 6 calls were split evenly between calls related to down power lines and miscellaneous calls.

We have not had any response yet to the two grant requests, one for the replacement of Engine 2 and one for an exhaust system for the fire house. The grants were submitted back in the spring. In addition to those grants, another grant was recently submitted to replace the radio in Engine 1. We anxiously await a response to these 3 grants which could dramatically help to bring both our truck fleet and our firehouse to a new level of functioning.

Do you have a building you've been meaning to tear down? We are in search of old buildings, barns and/or sheds to use for practice burns. If you have such a structure that you would be willing to "donate" to our department, please contact John Durkee at 889-3408.

Finally, our annual coin drop fundraiser will be organized by Matt Loftus this year. If you are able to donate any time to this event which will be on **Friday September 14th and Saturday September 15th**, please contact Matt at 889-3274. We need around 15 people for shifts each day to help us make this event successful & we appreciate any time you may have to offer.

This being an odd year I am working on Purging of the Checklist; which requires sending challenge letters to any voter who hasn't voted in the last two Federal Elections; or may have moved from town but have not registered in another Town. This year the Town's Board of Civil Authority; which includes the Town Clerk, Justices of the Peace, Select Board and Town Agent have one property tax appeal hearing.

Tax bills will be sent out in the middle of August. We are printing them this week, and you can stop and pick it up, if you want it earlier.

The municipal tax rate this year is \$0.589. This is down from last year's rate of \$0.617. The estimated rate in the town report was \$0.64. The \$0.589 is made up of the selectmen's budget (\$0.119), the highway budget (\$0.376) and appropriations (\$0.094). The reason behind the drop from the estimate is 1.) a surplus of \$26,279.26 in the selectmen's budget, 2.) \$8,102.36 remaining in the legal fund from the Washington Electric lawsuit and 3.) \$10,276.25 left over from the water project. The surplus in the selectmen's budget is mainly due to more income than budgeted in hold harmless, interest and dump tickets.

The Homestead education tax rate is \$1.425 and the Non-residential education rate is \$1.6512, making the total tax rate for homesteads \$2.014 and the total for non-residential parcels \$2.3301. You can figure out what your taxes will be by taking your grand list value, dividing that by 100 and multiplying by your tax rate. If you receive a state payment it will show as a credit on your tax bill.

Recycling Trivia* and Thoughts to Ponder

- A quart of motor oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water and 1 acre of land 1 inch deep.
- Americans throw away enough used motor oil every year to fill 120 supertankers.
- If all used motor oil in the U.S. were recycled, it would result in a saving of 1.3 million barrels of oil per day.
- The U.S. currently imports about 60% of our oil and within 20 years we will be importing 100% at a cost of \$150 billion annually.
- The world will need twice the raw materials in 2010 that it does today. Maintaining the same level of oil usage will require discovering as much in the next 10 years as has been found in all of history.
- Every minute of every day over 120,000 aluminum cans are recycled in the U.S.
- Americans discard enough aluminum to rebuild our entire commercial air fleet every 3 months.
- It's estimated that since 1972 some 13 million tons of aluminum cans have been recycled in the U.S. These 534.7 billion aluminum cans placed end-to-end could stretch to the moon some 170 times.

Tunbridge Board of Listers

The board lodged the 2007 Grand List on July 24th. Once the Grand List is lodged, the Listers cannot change the values. Changes can only be made by the Selectboard or the Board of Abatement and only for very specific reasons such as the building was destroyed by fire. No municipal body has the authority to change a listed value because a property owner believes the taxes are too high. If you think your taxes are too high, plan to attend the Town Meeting in March and let your objections be known and talk to your legislator about the State Education Tax.

The total value of the taxable Grand List for 2007 is \$110,296,691. There are 859 taxable parcels and 434 declared homesteads (as of Aug. 1st).

We have begun our rotational inspections which this year will include all roads in the southeast quadrant of town from Potash Road to Button Hill Road, plus Spring, Gould, Goodwin Hill, Tunbridge Mountain and Whalen roads. We sent letters to property owners in these areas to advise them of the inspections.

These rotational inspections give the Listers an opportunity to review all properties in the town in a four-year period, to note any noticeable improvement or depreciation in the property and to correct any errors in our existing data. We first look at the exterior, take pictures and notes. We compare that information with the pictures and notes taken at our last inspection. We may call and ask to view the interior of a dwelling if we believe we need more information. In addition to the rotational inspections we will visit properties with new construction.

Dinner, Photo & Quilt Raffle To Help Fund Church Repairs

A dinner for four catered by JP and Judi Debeuf; a Stephen Baumbach photograph, "Tunbridge Morning," and an antique quilt are the prizes in the Tunbridge Historical Society's annual raffle. Raffle prize tickets will be sold until October. This is the society's ninth year of raising money to restore the 1870 North Tunbridge Baptist Church, which has been closed for more than a year because of water damage.

The Debeufs, new owners of the Tunbridge Village Store, will cater a dinner for four within 20 miles of Tunbridge. They have been in the restaurant business for over 20 years, most recently owning two restaurants in New Hampshire, one of which was voted the best restaurant in Southern New Hampshire.

Part-time Tunbridge resident Stephen Baumbach of Rivertree Photography donated a color photograph which he took from Mill Bridge in the Village. He exhibited dozens of his beautiful color photos at the library early this year.

Ella Pappius of Tunbridge, a prize-winning quilt maker, donated a 1940s Grandmother's Flower Garden quilt that measures 76x84 inches. The quilt was made in Lancaster, Pa., and is hand-pieced and hand-quilted at 8 stitches per inch.

The church building has been closed to annual church services held in the building in August and historical society meetings since areas around the steeple leaked and portions of the inside ceiling of the vestibule and Sunday school room collapsed. The society had previously spent thousands of dollars raised in raffles to paint the church, make steeple repairs and protect the lawn.
