

“Take me home, country roads.” This summer, if you happened to live on Monarch Hill Road, you could have sung all of John Denver’s song (and, perhaps, Toots and the Maytals’ version, too) by the time you’d driven up the Spring Road and back down Monarch to get to your home. Fortunately, by the time you read this, the brand new Monarch Hill Road bridge may be open for use by residents, milk trucks and coyotes. If the concrete is still curing by publication (who knew that concrete, like cheddar, needs time to mature), it should be aged to perfection by the first week in October.

The Monarch Hill bridge wasn’t the only bridge in Tunbridge getting attention this summer. Water had worked in behind the stones in the Foundry Road bridge abutments and this required chinking (squeezing smaller stones in the cracks) to stabilize the abutments. The Howe bridge needed a punky beam replaced. The Randall Hoyt Company ably repaired both these bridges.

Once Monarch Hill is accessible from the Fire Station side, it’s worth a Sunday drive up the road to see the ditching and culverting that the Road Crew and Loftus Construction did from the Ware’s down. This was part of a Better Back Roads grant and Tunbridge’s part of the matching grant was to execute the work.

To keep those nice U-ditches open, the Road Crew requested a PTO-driven leaf blower, something Rodney has seen used efficiently by the Sharon Road Crew. The Selectboard approved of this purchase.

The Road Crew is also testing backhoes, expecting to replace the old Case by the time the snow flies. Case, Cat and John Deere are all vying for our business.

Mike Mulligan and his steam shovel, Mary Anne, did an expert job making a slope to stabilize the infamous crumbling wall behind the Town Offices. Did I say “Mike Mulligan?” I meant to say Matt Loftus. We would also like to thank the Union Agricultural Society (AKA, the Fair) for giving us a footing to work from.

Rodney asks Tunbridgians two favors: One, apple trees often over-spread town roads, scraping town vehicles and other big rigs. It’s town policy

not to prune fruit trees, but it would be much appreciated if landowners kept their Granny Smiths in line. Two, storm water often runs right down drive-ways into the town roads, either gullyng out the bigger road or leaving a delta of rubble in the right-of-way. Landowners who can divert the storm water before it reaches the town road are doing the town a great service.

More inconvenience ahead: The Town Hall kitchen is due to get a beautiful makeover in October. This will mean no kitchen use for four to six weeks. Jonni Spaulding of Catamount Kitchens has been coordinating this effort, and, after getting good feedback from residents and resident cooks (the Rec Dept.), she is ready to find a contractor who can turn her 3D plans into 3D reality.

Batchelder Associates has finished the outside audit, with recommendations on tightening controls. With guidance from the Town Auditors, the Selectboard voted to accept the audit and move forward with another outside audit for FY 17/18. Auditing firms will be auditioning, this fall, for this job.

The Selectboard would like to take credit for all those Monarch butterflies flying around Tunbridge this summer, but, to be honest, we had nothing to do with it. There is no line item for milkweed in the budget.

The Primary Election was held on August 14th, 2018, with 242 Tunbridge voters participating.

The General Election will be held on November 6, 2018 at the Tunbridge Town Hall. Polls will be open from 7:00 am till 7:00 pm. If you are a resident and have not yet registered to vote, you may do so at the Clerk's Office, DMV, or online at My Voter Page on the Secretary of States website. Absentee Ballots will be available at the Clerk's Office 45 days prior to the Election.

Important update- You may request an Absentee Ballot for a family member by filling out the Absentee Request form. You may NOT, however, take that Ballot from the office. It is required by law to then be mailed to the voter. Election updates state that "No other person except the voter can pick up a ballot for a voter- not the spouse, not the son or daughter, not the parent."

For the elderly or disabled- If you cannot leave your home, you may either request an Absentee Ballot be mailed to you, or 2 Justices of the Peace may bring your Ballot to your home, wait while you complete it, and then return it to the Town Clerk.

WHERE DO I GO FOR? There seems to be a little bit of confusion as to which office does what here in the Town Offices. In order to best direct you to the office that can best meet your needs here is a short list of where to go for specific services:

Town Clerk's office- (802) 889-5521-Land Records, Deeds, Surveys, Birth Records, Death Records, Marriage licenses and marriage records, Dog licenses, Transfer Station tickets, Voter registration, Green Mountain Passports, Property Posting, Selectboard minutes, misc. copying and faxing, and Notary services.

Treasurer's office- (802) 889-3571-Property Taxes are mailed out by and are payable to the Treasurer. All Accounts payable and receivable, Town and School payroll, Tax Exempt forms, Insurance records, Vendor records, Current and Delinquent Tax information.

Lister's office- (802) 889-3571-Lister Cards, Tax Bills, Parcel maps, Assessment information, Subdivision information, Flood Plain information, new 911 addresses, Grievances, Homestead filings.

Contact information for all Town Officers is posted on the Tunbridge website- www.tunbridgevt.org. Please visit the site and look around a bit. There is a lot of good information posted there as well as some wonderful pictures of Tunbridge.

For quarterly rotation this year we are focusing on the northeast corner of town and have sent out notices that we hope to be doing brief exterior inspections and updating our photos of properties in that portion of town. We also try to schedule a visit when there is new construction or significant changes to property in any portion of town.

We are still working on Homestead Declarations and Property Tax Adjustment requests. Significant processing delays related to an unanticipated need for manual error checking at the state level this year have meant that timely filed homestead and property tax adjustments (credited as "STATE PAYMENT" on eligible tax bills) have not showed up properly on some of the tax bills issued at the end of August. Another round of property tax adjustment credits were issued September 7, as will an additional round on November 1 - which is when taxes are due. Revised tax bills will be issued if a Homestead Declaration or Property Tax Adjustment is corrected in this process. If you think you filed on time and should have received a state payment, feel free to give our office a call. If we cannot resolve your issue VT Taxpayer Services phone number is 802-828-2865 which may help clarify the issue.

Although the deadline for late filing has been extended by the legislature to October 15, it is in your best interest to file your Homestead Declaration and Property Tax Adjustment by April 15 (the actual due date) so the town receives the state payment in a timely fashion. In addition, please make sure to use the correct SPAN (School Property Account Number) from your previous year's tax bill, or feel free to give our office a call to get your SPAN number. Many of the errors that needed to be manually checked this year came from incorrect SPAN numbers.

While we have not fully assembled the numbers for this year, preliminary evidence indicates more market activity this year than in the last several years, and several recent sales have come in above the current town-assessed value. Our last town-wide reappraisal was in 2010, and our Common Level of Appraisal (CLA) crept up each year until 2016-2017, after which it started to drop again (101.79%, 102.75%, 106.04%, 111.95%, 114.93%, 116.38%, 111.06%). The CLA is based on a statewide sales study, and is an equalization adjustment designed to bring each town's grand list to fair market value and thus level the field between towns when calculating education taxes. The 2018-2019 CLA revision will be released January 2019.

Dear Friends.

The Alliance for Vermont Communities has been busy planning and thinking about our work and the continued importance of our efforts now that David Hall has publicly stated that he is withdrawing NewVistas from Vermont. Below are some updates on our work.

The Future of the NewVistas Land

The fate of the 1554 acres of Land purchased by New Vistas Foundation/ Windsorange, LLC is yet to be determined. There have been some conversations among conservation organizations and town officials, but coordination is complex. We at AVC feel there is potential that the situation may offer a unique opportunity to take a long view at conservation and land use possibilities in our region.

The Upper Valley Land Trust has taken the lead in conversations with David Hall. Hall has said that he wanted to sell or make a deal that involves all the land but there is some indication that the possibility of it happening is slim. Mr. Hall has said he has an interest in conserving some of the land though he has begun to list the properties separately. One notable parcel on the market is the 500 acre Clifford Farm at a listing price of 2.9M. We will keep you updated as more is learned.

Meeting With The Governor

A group of 6 representatives from the Upper Valley met with Governor Scott on August 29th. The primary goal of the meeting was to discuss what actions have been successful in dealing with rural economic development in the state. Four areas of interest were education, a land based economy, housing and recreation opportunities.

Attending were:

Governor Scott, Tayt Brooks, Dir. of Affordability and Economic Initiatives, representing the Governor's office, Tim Briglin, State Representative from Thetford; Strafford and Sharon; Sarah Danly, Farm to Plate/ Vermont Sustainable Jobs Fund; Zac Freeman, Rochester/Randolph Area Sports Trail Alliance (RASTA); Brenda Petrella, AVC board member; Alex Buskey, AVC Outreach Coordinator; Michael Sacca, AVC board president.

A follow up roundtable is planned around the topic of economic development with selected economic development innovators from around the state, state officials and the Governor's office. No date has been set, please watch for details.

Ashley Community Forest

AVC, with the assistance of the Vermont Land Trust, purchased the 218 acre Ashley parcel in early June of this year. With an offer on this unique piece of property from NewVistas in January of 2018, we jumped at the opportunity to conserve it for recreation and forestry purposes. The Ashley parcel borders the Manning Farm, purchased by Strafford Organic Creamery and conserved by the Upper Valley Land Trust early this year.

AVC board members have met with town officials from both Strafford and Sharon to give an overview of how the project came to be, the recreation and forestry potential of community forests and the process and challenges of creating a management plan. We will be continuing our discussions with both towns and our partners at the Vermont Land Trust in the coming weeks.

We had a great walk with a small group through some existing trails on the property. There was a lot of excitement around the time spent exploring the remnants of the original homestead. The stone work left behind is incredible and we hope it will serve as a great historical education site in the future. In general there has been a positive outlook from both towns on the future of the land as a community forest and outdoor recreation hub. Watch for the announcements of public discussions in early fall as well as a date for an outing on the property. A sincere thank you to all of you for investing in a truly sustainable and vibrant future for these communities.
