Looking back at last quarter's TQ, we seemed to have COVID licked and life was returning to normal in our pretty darn close to perfect town. Not so fast! As the Delta variant has deterred our march to a post-pandemic world, now it appears that we were darn lucky to hold our two big town events this summer: The Memorial Day Parade (which took place on July 5th) and the Tunbridge World's Fair. Looking back to a year ago, we are certainly in a better place to fight COVID now: The majority of Tunbridgians have been vaccinated. Before the next TQ comes out, many children, ages 5 to 11, will be able to get vaccinated. In the Town Offices, safety windows, masks and sanitizer have become the new normal. At the moment, Selectboard meetings are in-person, but Zoom accessible. So for now, good job Tunbridge, and let's keep on keeping on.

After a relatively benign summer, the Road Crew is preparing for the long haul of a winter. Mountains of sand and stone have been trucked to Tunbridge in anticipation of slippery roads, multiple mud seasons, and water going places it has no business going. Our new, beef Chevy one-ton is about to arrive. What many readers may not know is that when a municipality buys a new dump truck, first, you get the truck—engine, frame, cab—then you send the vehicle to another company that attaches the dump part to the truck. This modification process is never speedy, and during COVID, with parts shortages and workforce challenges, delivery has been slower than molasses. And speaking of shortages, there isn't a culvert in stock anywhere in New England. No doubt having to do with supply and demand in a global economy, culverts are this year's toilet paper.

After months of due diligence, the Trails Committee and the Planning Commission are about to present their recommendations on usage of our four Legal Trails. Their research and openness to hearing all sides of the discussion has been exemplary. The high emotions and rancor that have accompanied the debate have made it clear to the Selectboard that

any policy or ordinance governing access to these trails should keep one thing in mind: What is best for Tunbridge?

Even though its only fall, and Town Meeting seems a long ways off, the Selectboard will soon start working on next year's budget. That said, if you have any good ideas that would make Tunbridge a better town and that might require funding, or--just as welcomed--any ideas that might save the Town money, please be in touch.

Greetings from the lister office, with sincere thanks and congratulations fHappy Fall from the lister office. We are attempting to get on the road to start the Northwest rotation, (VT Route 110 and west, Spring Rd. and north). Our post cards went out awhile ago, so this can be another reminder of us riding the roads in that area of Town in the coming months. These visits help us to stay current with changes that occur, we take exterior pictures of your property and would call you should we see something that would require an inside inspection. Thank you for being kind to us.

As mentioned prior, we are open on Tuesday and Friday from 9-3, and email or phone is the best way to reach us, thus that takes up a fair amount of time responding, so thanks for your patience in this area. We are still checking Homestead Declarations weekly. You can file a late homestead declaration and Property Tax Credit claim until October 15, 2021, though late fees and penalties will apply. If you have not received your tax bill (and you should have, they were sent middle of August) please contact us at the number above, we may have an incorrect address. Revised Tax Bills are being sent out as Declarations are made.

We will review our 2021 sales with our District Advisor in the coming month. Our preliminary report indicates 70 transfers from April 1, 2020 to March 31, 2021, a 27% increase from last year (significantly higher than the 17% increase in 2020). Of that number, 22 appear "valid" on initial review (not family members, divorce, life estates, subdivisions, etc.) – a 22% increase from last year (was 6 % in 2020).

An annual statewide Sales Study determines our Common Level of Appraisal (CLA), an equalization adjustment designed to bring each town's grand list to fair market value and thus level the field between towns when calculating education taxes. Our last town-wide reappraisal was in 2010, and our CLA crept up each year until 2016-2017, after which it started to drop again (101.79%, 102.75%, 106.04%, 111.95%, 114.93%, 116.38%, 111.06%, 105.97%; 103.22%).

The 2021 CLA will be released in early January 2022 with full results of the statewide Sales Study.

- Simple repairs to household appliances

- Help with gardening, lawn care or stacking firewood
- Shoveling snow off walkways and steps
- Other reasonable requests

Many of our volunteers are fully vaccinated now and once again able to provide rides to Tunbridge residents. Rides could include transportation to and from nearby medical appointments, church and other local events, car repair/service appointments and shopping trips. Please be aware that volunteer drivers may ask passengers to wear masks, sit in the back seat and open car windows.

Anyone needing help with something should call 802-889-3437; advance notice is appreciated. We do our best to find a volunteer who is available for that specific request at that specific time and date. However, on occasion that is not possible.

What to expect when you return to the Senior Centers:

LUNCH WILL BE SERVED AT 12 NOON

1. Please conduct your own “Daily Health Check” prior to arrival to the center and answer the following questions.

A. Have you been in contact with a person who has Covid-19 in the pasted 14 days?

B. Do you have a temperature above normal?

C. Do you feel unwell with any symptoms consistent with Covid-19? This includes cough, fever, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, chills, body aches, headache, sore throat, new loss of taste or smell, runny nose, nausea, vomiting or diarrhea?

D. Are you waiting on the results of a Covid-19 test?

E. If you answer YES, to any of these questions, Please Stay Home.

2. Please use the hand sanitizer upon entering the Center.

3. Masks are recommended, but are optional for fully vaccinated participants.

Masks are Required for those not fully vaccinated. Anyone should feel comfortable wearing a mask if that is their preference. Once you are seated and ready to eat you can remove the mask.

4. People coming in are free to sit wherever they wish. Once seated, the place setting will be brought to the table. The server will then ask you if you would like a drink of Milk, Juice, Water, Coffee or Tea. They will serve you, please stay seated. They will also serve you your Meal.

Alliance for Vermont Communities

In 2019, residents of Royalton, Sharon, Strafford, and Tunbridge came together through the Vermont Council on Rural Development Community Visit Program. This Community Visit process engaged over 320 residents of the four towns in a series of dialogues surrounding common interests, needs, and solutions. The Four-Town Coalition was born, within which volunteer committees formed to support projects around housing, economic development, local food resiliency and access, supporting the working landscape, and recreation and natural resource protection. (The full action report generated by this process is available on the Vermont Council on Rural Development website.)

In the two years since the formation of the Coalition, these groups have undertaken a tremendous amount of work on an exclusively volunteer basis. The Coalition is now ready to advance to its next phase. To fully leverage this momentum, to be able to take on more ambitious projects and find solutions to more complex problems, and to more strategically coordinate between these interrelated community priorities, requires additional capacity.

The Coalition has successfully taken advantage of an opportunity to utilize a full-time 3-year Americorps VISTA position hosted by the Green Mountain Economic Development Corporation and has hired Meghan Asbury to fill the position. Funding for the position was generously made by the 4 towns selectboards, VCRD, and AVC who each gave \$1000. Meghan has a masters degree in urban planning, with experience doing community engagement. Meghan will help coordinate and facilitate Coalition meetings; build public relationships through communications and community outreach; research case studies relevant to Coalition projects; and explore long-term organizational structure options for the Coalition that will help build capacity and funding for ongoing efforts.

The position will be supervised by a Steering Committee of the 4-Town Coalition, in collaboration with GMEDC staff. The Steering Committee will consist of Sarah Danly, Royalton (chair), Mark Black, Strafford, Suzanne Long, Royalton, Michael Sacca, Megan Fuerst, both of Tunbridge, Ken Wright, Sharon, Upon its formation in 2019, the 4-Town Coalition was organized into three committees: Economic Development, Housing, and Natural Resources and the Working Landscape all within a broader umbrella of Community Development. This structure will be reorganized and simplified to be individual project teams; Housing, Food Resilience, Agriculture, Conservation and Recreation, all within a broader umbrella of Community Development.

The Food Resilience committee is focused on building connections between producers, homesteaders, and other community members to increase food security and community food resilience. The Ag Network committee formed to build a support network for farmers throughout the community, to inventory our agricultural land base, and ultimately to help connect farmers to land and to each other. The Housing committee began its work by conducting research into potential models for addressing affordable housing shortages and building relationships with key housing partners such as Twin Pines and the Vital Communities Keys to the Valley initiative. The Conservation and Recreations group formed in 2019 as part of a larger effort underway in our 4-Town region to build and promote hiking, biking and skiing trails to increase opportunities for residents and to promote economic development. Stay tuned for announcements for community meetings.
