

## **Tunbridge Select Board**

Town Meeting-in-May, if not a Tunbridge tradition, did have a pandemic-motivated sophomore year on the Fairgrounds, with first-time moderator Izzy Provoncha capably guiding the process. With a tweak here and a tweak there, the General Fund and Highway budgets passed, readying the town for Fiscal Year 22/23. The liveliest discussion arose over the proposal of hiring a part-time town nurse. While there was concern that such a position might be redundant with services already provided, ultimately the voters said, "Let's try it for a year and see how it goes."

In a return to tradition, the Memorial Day parade went off wonderfully on Memorial Day, with everything from bedecked floats to the reading of "In Flanders Fields," to the Fire Department's chicken barbecue. With the Tunbridge Fair celebrating its 150th anniversary this year, a varied contingent of prized ruminants and avid participants made up a goodly portion of the marchers.

Back to business, the Selectboard continues to do due diligence on legal trails, aiming for an outcome that allows for access to rights-of-way while respecting abutting landowners. With a legal challenge now filed against the town, the Selectboard, Planning Commission, and Trails Committee, have been methodically working through all the contingencies and responsibilities associated with legal trails. For example, the Department of Environmental Conservation (the State of Vermont's wetland police), finally confirmed, in writing, that the only time they would get involved in legal trails crossing mapped wetlands would be if 1) improvements were made to the right-of-way, or 2) there was a complaint made about degradation of the wetland by through traffic. The Selectboard has consistently held the position that no town funds will be spent maintaining or improving legal trails. If, in the future, it is seen that, in the best interest of the town, some of the legal trails should be improved for better access and enjoyment, donations, volunteers, and State permitting will be folded into the process, with a special attention to be paid to abutting landowner for consent or viable workarounds.

While the town of Tunbridge is not a trucking business, it does take a whole lot of diesel engines to keep Tunbridge truckin'. Dump trucks, a grader, a backhoe, a loader, a tractor for roadside mowing, all burn fuel that costs about twice what it did this time last year. After years of relative stability, the war in Ukraine has ignited a budget-busting spike in fossil fuels the likes of which we haven't experienced since the heyday of OPEC. Not only is it more expensive to use our fleet on our 70 plus miles of town highways, raw materials are affected, too. Sand has to be trucked to Tunbridge. Quarries use diesel loaders. Even grease is hard to find, back-ordered everywhere. With no end to the inflation and gouging in sight, we have to make do with tightening our belts and remember that misery loves company—every municipality is struggling with this situation.

With almost \$400,000 available to Tunbridge in coming ARPA funds—provided we “play by the rules”—the Emergency Management Director (Brenda Field) and the Treasurer (Becky Hoyt) recently proposed that we hire a grants manager to oversee the complex process, from application to audit. How the 400 K is spent depends as much on our accounting methods as our needs. And the State of Vermont has additional millions in ARPA funds that it can disperse to towns—with some of that accessible to Tunbridge if we know where to look or when to apply. Best of all, a grants manager can be paid by those very ARPA funds. Over the next three to four years, it's up to Tunbridge to figure out infrastructure and emergency priorities that we would like to see to fruition. Stay tuned!

As we await the resurrection of our downtown kiosk (AKA a bulletin board), it seems appropriate to announce here the arrival of two municipal babies, Town Clerk, Jr. and Transfer Station Attendant, Jr.. Congratulations to the parents and a word to the infants: Welcome to Tunbridge, not perfect but pretty darn close!

Your Conservation Commission embarked on a five-year project planning process this spring with the support of Jens Hilke, Conservation Planner at the Vermont Department of Fish and Wildlife. We will be setting a calendar to ensure we address the many priorities our members have identified.

We are interested in feedback on the changing demographics in Tunbridge. Specifically we'd like to know what percentage of our population is now Eastern Bluebirds, having distributed 78 bird houses this spring. At my house the bluebird caucus now outnumbers the human. Have you had a successful fledging? Send us your birth announcements!

We are excited to be collaborating with the Town Forest Committee and the Trails Committee to lightly develop trails and recreation use on the Town Forest - "Garage Lot." At Town Meeting we announced an upcoming contest to rename the "Garage Lot." Events to get to know our town forest will be forthcoming this summer and fall.

We will head to the First Branch in late summer for another clean-up event. Last year's effort removed many tires and fascinating pieces of scrap metal around Cilley Bridge. Your help is very welcome, stay tuned for an event announcement.

Our Woodlands for Wildlife event held at Larry Mengedoht's was wildly successful, with forty participants. We appreciated the blend of both long-time and new local landowners all eager to learn about and share forest management practices. The Tunbridge Community Food Shelf has exciting news. We have purchase a CSA from Tunbridge Hill Farm which will supply fresh vegetables throughout the summer and early fall. Vegetables can be picked up at any time in the newly organized food pantry area and will be available as long as they last. The CSA is picked up by our volunteers, on Monday afternoons, so it would be wise to stop by early in the week, although fresh items are also rotated in, throughout the week as well.

The pantry is found in the creche structure in front of the Parish House, which is across the road from the town offices and the Tunbridge Church. The need for fresh items was the reason for establishing the food pantry. It features items to help supplement a families' meals: pasta and sauce, tuna, soups, canned veggies and fruits, peanut butter and jelly, cereal, and more. Items will vary from week to week. The pantry is an experiment by the food shelf committee in an attempt to make more food available to anyone who needs it. All local residents are invited to pick up items they need and even encouraged to drop off items to share with their neighbors. For a greater selection, people are encouraged to visit the food shelf during the regular hours 4:00 to 6:00 every Friday afternoon, also.

The committee wishes to thank Tunbridge Hill Farm, NOFA and Laura Gillen for monetary donations and support. Special thanks go to Barrett Phillips for the gift of a mini refrigerator (after we experienced a couple of packages of wilted greens). A recent donation of tomato and pepper plants by Rick and Lorraine Barnaby was also very appreciated.

Items most requested by food shelf recipients are baking products, ie. flour, sugar, brown sugar, etc. and easy to prepare items such as cake and pudding mixes. These items would be better if left inside the food shelf building, however. All donations are gladly accepted, though. Additional vegetables and fruits from local gardens are always welcome. Later in the summer we will also be enjoying the produce from the local community garden as well.

A twice-a-week session of the free Better Bones balance and weight-bearing exercise program is offered at the Town Hall on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 5 p.m. It is aimed at increasing bone density at an age when bone mass is lost and osteoporosis is a concern. Anyone can drop in for a session. A doctor's permission is requested for those who continue with the program.
