

# **Tunbridge Select Board**

Post-Fair Tunbridge acknowledges that summer is over and there is much work to be done before winter. While this edition of the TUNBRIDGE QUARTERLY arrives right around peak foliage, it won't be long before it's stick season, hunting season, and the holidays. Roger Hill, the WDEV meteorologist, claims that, in most years, the snow comes to stay around December 7 (Pearl Harbor Day). Of course, there have been years when the white stuff surprised us as early as Halloween and scarily never fully melted.

It's this looming change in the weather that keeps the Road Crew busy. This Fall, the Strafford Road is our number one priority before the frost sets in. Strafford Road, Part 1. Either just before the TQ arrives in the mail, or soon after, the Strafford Road will be closed in order to replace an ancient stone culvert, mortally wounded by high water on 7/10/23, at the four corners of Tuttle Road and Hoyt Hill Road. With FEMA calling the shots and paying the \$200,000 bill, municipal Tunbridge has to do this job to federal and state specs—anytime water is diverted it's a complicated process, with multiple agencies involved, and, in this case, a "squished culvert" is being custom-made for the site. Detours and delays will be with us for a couple of weeks. Trucks will have to loop all the way to Jenkins Brook Road and use the County Road.

Strafford Road, Part 2. The July 7th flooding also caused three new landslides, where the super-saturated soil just let go when the roadway became river that day. These spots can be patched and stabilized using a combination of boulders and crushed stone, and the excavation shouldn't require closing the Strafford Road.

Strafford Road, Part 3. The most problematic fix of all is the spot marked with stop signs, between Drew Road and the Rec Road. It's a long ways down from the Strafford Road to the old Gay Brothers Woolen Mill dam, and even the state-ordered hydrology engineer isn't confident that the boulder and crushed stone solution will be a permanent fix here. Ultimately, the Strafford Road may have to be moved over, by the width of the road, away from the First Branch. But that idea involves property owners' rights,

rights-of-way, and a budget in the millions; not something that will be completed by the time the turkey is laid on the table with the cranberry sauce and creamed onions.

The Selectboard would like to give a shout-out of appreciation to the team that has guided Tunbridge through the events of July 7th and July 17th (a destructive straight wind wallop centered on Town Farm Road and Potash) and the post-event clean-up and coordination with FEMA. Emergency Management Director, Brenda Field, Tunbridge Volunteer Fire Department Chief, Simon Bradford, Road Foreman, Rodney Hoyt, Town Clerk, Mariah Cilley, and Grants Manager, Maryann Caron, have spent countless hours and shown remarkable stick-to-it-ness in making sure we utilize all the state and federal monies available to the town for post and future emergencies. To that end, Tunbridge recently won a grant, leveraging our ARPA funds, that has allowed the town to install ultra high-band radios at the Town Offices and Fire Station, upgrades that will make those sites better command centers in the event of emergencies.

On a personal note, I would like to thank all the Tunbridgians who wished me well after my recent heart attack. I would like to lay the blame for the episode on the never-ending legal trails litigation, but, in reality, it's a genetic thing (my brother, at 51, had exactly the same 90% blockage of exactly the same artery). Now with a stent and a daily diet of three pills, I should have no restrictions if I use common sense. The cardiologist told me, "Don't pick up anything that makes your eyes bulge out." Good advice for all of us.

## **Tunbridge Board of Listers**

Greetings from the Lister Office. As fall sets in, we find ourselves reviewing sales and accounting late changes as the November 1 deadline for paying taxes approaches. Although we do not technically collect taxes, Vermont's complex system of taxation necessitates close coordination with the Treasurer, Town Clerk, and all other town staff, and we are grateful to have strong relationships that smooth the way for you and us. A gesture of kindness is multiplied along the way.

We have office hours on Tuesday and Friday from 9-3, and email is the best way to reach us; phone messages are generally checked during office hours, and often in between. We are still checking Homestead Declarations weekly. You can file a late homestead declaration and Property Tax Credit claim until October 15, 2023, though late fees and penalties will apply. If you have not received your tax bill (and you should have, they were sent in late August) please contact us at the number above, we may have an incorrect address. Revised Tax Bills are sent out if late Homestead Declarations are made.

We are also starting our Southeast quarterly rotation visits (east of VT Route 110, and south of Drew and Hoyt Hill Rds.). Our postcards went out to landowners in this area of Town a while ago, so this is an extra reminder of visits there in the coming months. These visits help us stay current with changes; we update exterior pictures of your property and will call you if an inside inspection would be helpful. We would also appreciate a heads-up if there are significant changes to your property (up or down), whether you are in this portion of town or not.

In 2021 and 2022 the sales trend in Tunbridge was mostly a quicker turn-around on sales, but in 2023 sale prices in Tunbridge have followed the rising tide evident throughout the state. Due to the rapid increase in sales prices statewide, legislation passed in 2023 eliminates the Common Level of Appraisal (CLA) as a determining factor in whether to mandate a town-wide appraisal. Although not yet in place, current recommendations are that all towns will need to conduct a town-wide reappraisal at most every six years.

Formerly, a town-wide reappraisal was mandated if CLA was below 85% or above 115%, or Coefficient of Dispersion (COD), a measure of equity within town, was above 20%. In 2023, 65% of towns in Vermont had town-wide reappraisals triggered by this threshold. With a six-year maximum window for reappraisals likely to pass soon, the current trigger relies solely on a COD above 20%.

Our current COD is 16.98%; a COD of less than 10% is considered indicative of a high degree of equity within town. Our last town-wide reappraisal was in 2010, and our current CLA is 91.38%.

It is important to remember that the amount of taxes is based on what we vote at town meeting (municipal taxes) as well as our Education funding, divided by the total Grand List. The amount of taxes needed to be raised is a given, but the Grand List (cumulative value of all assessments in town) accounts for how those taxes are divided up - hence our efforts to keep things fair and equitable. Keeping our records up to date is vital in this process.

The 2023 CLA and COD will be released in early January 2024 with full results of the statewide Sales Study.

#### **Intelligence Based Policing**

Central Vermont Intelligence Based Policing has been working on an initiative to promote our overall goal of reducing in crime in our area. The problems span policing, the courts and the corrections department. Policing is the issue we are working on now. The courts and corrections departments will take a greater effort, politicly, to correct.

I have met with several area select boards to promote a cooperative effort by two or more towns to join forces in acquiring police services. The idea comes from a couple of towns in Vermont that have utilized the policing forces already in place in one town to provide policing in the adjoining town. The practice accomplishes several things. It places officer's familiar with the area in the area, the citizens get to know the officers, the officers get to know the people. In part based on the old "Officer Friendly Program", this results in better communication between the citizens and the police. Without this communication the police are at a disadvantage in solving much of the crime taking place.

With limited officers and large patrol areas our State Police are often times an hour to respond to an incident. Keeping patrol areas smaller results in faster response times.

The costs for individual towns to setup their own police departments is great. By cooperating two or more adjoining towns into a policing area these costs can be supported by a wider tax base. By contracting services through an already established policing agency much of the initial cost of property, equipment and administrative fees can be greatly reduced. To start, I contacted the towns of Chelsea, and Tunbridge. Vershire and Strafford have since been included in the promotion of this idea. Strafford, Tunbridge and Chelsea have all indicated an interest and each has or is in the process of meeting area policing agencies to gather additional information.

One of the things that we have learned from past policing contracts is that while some patrols have happened, little if any actual policing has occurred. It is evident that a few hours of patrol dollars do not result in tickets being issued or crimes being investigated. By acting locally, we can accomplish this but we must start by giving the support necessary to form and finance policing within our area.

Much has been going on that was the result of the flood and our wind event. A huge thank you to the Tunbridge road crew and our Tunbridge Fire Department for many hours of working in the rain cutting trees, directing traffic, checking on folks and most of all the road crew repairing roads. Our grants manager, MaryAnn Caron is enjoying her hours/days of filling out FEMA forms and meeting with all the FEMA folks.

I am getting a dozen more water test kits this week from the state. I will hand these out, set up a test date and deliver it to the WRJ office to double check those wells that need it. Call me for one if you believe you need to test or retest at the number above.

A caution from the state that when you get to the stage of running the treatment out of your well, do not run your well dry as it can damage the pump in drilled wells.

As all of you know the Strafford road has issues. These issues will cause it to be closed for up to 3 to 4 weeks. Be prepared as cars and pick-up trucks can go around to N. Tunbridge but large trucks like delivery, fuel trucks, dump trucks etc will not be able to do that. Covered bridges and historic iron bridges can not manage those vehicles. Think about that and plan ahead. For example you may want to order your fuel delivery earlier etc. Rod is not sure when this could happen but he guesses closer to the end of October and even Nov. The town will let you know when we know.

#### **Tunbridge Town Nurse**

I got a call from a resident in north Tunbridge with positive Ecoli and chloriform on July 29th. I went for a home visit and discovered that yes their results were true the water was undrinkable. They had bought a test and tested getting results way faster than the Vermont state testing. So immediately first concern was the school and north Tunbridge store in which supplies food for a lot of the town. School thankfully was closed for summer and summer camp was at Chelsea campus and they were going to send a test. My first thought was it was river contamination, flood related. I made a post on my Tunbridge nurse website and town for everyone to test specifically along the river. I was able to get 14 tests from Barre. I also set up a water donation/supply donation with a contact I had made earlier in the flooding. So we set up Salvation Army supply drop on 8/1 at Tunbridge school. I met with residents, I educated on how to collect water samples and gave couple tests in Tunbridge town and up Whitney Rd to get some "control" tests". I brought the samples down to the WRJ lab later that after noon. Some residents met me there so I ended up dropping off 17 tests that day. Encouraging everyone to go get the bottled water at the school. We started getting results back via email on 8/3 and 8/4. They came through faster than we were told. It was mixed readings, it felt so random. North Tunbridge was negative but neighbors were positive and neighbors to the initial positive was negative. One resident's well who is right beside the river and across the road from the initial positive was completely negative not even a trace. This information was very confusing at first. As there are all different placement of wells. We got 30 more tests from fema, Brenda Field, Tunbridge's emergency manager director and I got the tests delivered and met up on Saturday 8/5 in north Tunbridge. We walked up and down north Tunbridge handing out water tests. Teaching how to test and how to sanitize your well if it was positive. We were able to hand out all 30 tests. Some got taken for other parts of Tunbridge along river, Monarch, Whitney, Howe, Potash, Hoyt Hill, Strafford and right along rte 110. The tests were all gone by the end of the day. My family and I also put cleaning, food and water donations at the 24 hour food shelf in Tunbridge and it was gone by the Sunday the next day. Monday 8/7 Brenda brought the tests to WRJ. Results back 8/6 and 8/7, trickling in all week. Brenda and I used the White river partnership 2023 Swim Smart Monitoring season test results as they tested. Realizing the river water contamination actually was trending down in our area. So ruling river contamination out. We started to realize the common determinants were how deep your well was and if your well was below

hillside and/or on saturated grounds. Where you were near run off it became very clear that the containment wells were dug or more shallow drilled wells. or even springs.

So at that point there were 16 positives all spread out thru Tunbridge with no relation to one containment or the riverside. We had wells only 100 feet from each-other one testing positive the other negative. But only 2/16 were artisan wells. So then this sparked to have everyone test your well no matter where you lived in Tunbridge. I was notified of another 6 positives after the initial 16 but a lot of people who tested did not report back to me or Brenda. We are now helping people safely treat and retest their wells. As it is crucial to do it correctly and safely as too much bleach can ruin the good bacteria in your septic. The water donation was being used that I put at the school to help people during this time.

This was definitely a big puzzle but everyone came together to take care each other. People helping me collect tests, people with negative wells giving water to people with positives. Residents reaching out saying they never knew Tunbridge had a community nurse. Meeting new clients I can help when the water issue calms down. We are still treating wells and helping people retest. Some people, even after treating once, still getting a positive result and having to treat again. We tested the Tunbridge fair grounds and made sure it was all set for the fair. I was so thankful we were able to catch this problem quickly and for all the help everyone gave to help resolve it.

I continue to work with clients with their needs. We are looking for anyone who wants to volunteer and or work as a caregiver so please reach to me for that or any other nursing issue.
