The last few months have seen our board lodge the Grand List, and give attention to grievance hearings. We appreciate any that have taken the time to bring concerns or questions to better understand the process of how we have come up with our property assessments. We also appreciate the patience folks have shown in hearing how changes are unfolding in the Use Value Appraisal ("Current Use") program and the veteran's exemptions (now administered by the Vermont office of Veterans' Affairs). Simple communication with the busy folks at the state offices becomes surprisingly complicated.

We have had the opportunity to work closely with the Select Board and Treasurer to explain our role as listers, the decisions we make, and the procedures we use in putting together the Grand List. Our current challenges involve replacing an aging computer and reviewing options to secure backup of our data.

Next, we will be reviewing the sales study, to calculate next year's Common Level of Appraisal-- the ratio of the listed value of sold properties divided by their sales prices. Currently the Common Level of Appraisal is just over 1.0179, and we expect that to be similar for this coming year.

This has been a busy quarter for the select board with some seemingly endless meetings and a lot accomplished. We close out the fiscal year with Irene now a last year story, fiscally speaking. Despite her best efforts we finished the year in the “Black” both in the High Way Fund and the Select board funds. As most of you have noticed we are in the midst of a fairly substantial paving project on the Strafford road which is partially funded with FEMA funds due to damage from Irene. Winter sand should be stockpiled by August and again, thanks to Irene we were able to purchase sand at a reduced rate from riverbed washouts. As some of you have also noticed we have been replacing culverts and working on roadside ditching on various roads throughout the town. Our major purchase was for new tires for the grader. Please be aware that roadside mowing will continue through August. The Select Board on behalf of the Town of Tunbridge thanks our road crew under the leadership of Rodney Hoyt for all the hard work and dedication.

Some other items of interest. The Select Board met with and wrote a letter of endorsement to the Websterville Baptist Churches school efforts to to change the State of Vermont guidelines for education funding. Currently the State restricts schools with Religious affiliations from having Town funding for students wishing to attend. This potentially costs the community thousands of dollars a year. More recently the Select board was approached by Gifford medical Hospital looking for a resolution supporting their efforts to build a care center in Randolph Center. This resolution asks the Governor to ask the State to redress the proposal that was recently reject. We unanimously supported the idea of a resolution to the Governor.

A few other items of business...

- The First Branch Ambulance received the funding they requested in Town meeting at a special meeting in June.
- The Select Board has hired Besaw & Associates to do an audit.
- We are working with the town Treasurer and the Auditors to come up with a streamlined book keeping program that will help us be more efficient.
- The town recently had a hazardous waste day.

A short reminder also that the transfer station is open Weds in the evening. Transfer Station hours 4:40PM-7:30PM

Finally our hats are off to the hard working volunteers at the town rec field. It is shaping up real nice.

ECFiber

East-Central Vermont Community Fiber-Optic Network

If you have not been aware of ECFiber and our drive to raise investments in Tunbridge please contact one of your Tunbridge ECFiber delegates and we can answer any further background questions you have. Or, goto: www.ecfiber.net

The first closing this year yielded more investments than projected over the 5 towns involved. So far in Tunbridge we have only enough to build a slim route coming up Rt.110 to Button Hill and into Strafford over Kibling. Customers will have service available as the cable is strung past their premise.

We were hoping to get into Tunbridge thru the South West corner and connect many more residents. But Alas, it comes down to money. ECFiber can't build it for us if the money isn't available. The staff at ECFiber continues to work tirelessly to do all they can with the resources they have. The more investments Tunbridge secures, the faster the expansion of the network will happen.

ECFiber perseveres in applying for the grants and loans that the state offers. Politics as it is, this small community-owned endeavor cannot seem to win over the corporations.

The good news is, we have recently heard that the state plans to use some of their money to build a section of "backbone" fiber lines that ECFiber can rent. There is expected to be a connection we can use near the bottom of the Chelsea Mountain Rd on Rt 110.

Pole applications have already been submitted for the routes mentioned above. Applications have also been submitted for all of Rt110 to Chelsea and for a loop off 110 running over Whitney Hill, around to the Chelsea Mtn Road, and back to Rt110.

The filing of pole applications signals ECFiber's commitment to build these routes but not the all money to do so. Tunbridge needs more investors to continue building the network with the goal of connecting everyone.

Terms of the investment: 15 year loan to ECFiber pays 7%. No payments in the first year, making the investment yield a bit over 6%.

Notes are available in \$2500. increments. One note yields interest of more than \$1,400. over the 15 years. The next closing on investments will happen in November. It is likely that the terms will change next year, offering a lower rate of return.

Please let us know if you could be an investor.

For folks who want the service but cannot be an investor, it is helpful to be informed. We hope you will subscribe when the service is available and if you know of someone else who may be willing and able to invest in this important project please ask them to contact us.

State Representative

You should have received a recent edition of "The Buxton Banner" this week. Please take a moment to review a couple key issues like the update on broadband access and overview of the GMP-CVPS merger.

A point of interest: One law, passed this session, stemmed from a community meeting held in Tunbridge last winter. John Durkee convened a meeting to discuss the growing substance abuse and crime issues in our community. Some voiced concern that pawnbrokers in Vermont were less regulated than their counterparts in New Hampshire. As of July 1, pawnbrokers must now verify and record the identity of those selling goods and hold the goods for 10 days before resale. We expect this will support better collaboration between business owners and law enforcement - and help victims of theft to regain their valuables.

Although the legislature doesn't meet during the summer, the Speaker has appointed me to a summer study committee on education. Our charge is to review and evaluate how Vermont currently allocates financial and other resources in a way that promotes high quality, equitable educational opportunities throughout the state. We are also charged with reviewing and evaluating how impediments to opportunity, such as poverty and substance abuse, may be mitigated.

I am already working with many of you, personally, on specific issues. I've started going door-to-door to chat with folks about various concerns - and look forward to seeing you! If you aren't home, I'll be leaving a survey that I hope you will consider completing and returning.

Don't forget, there is a primary election on August 28th. Be sure to vote - because EVERY VOTE MATTERS. If you want to vote early, drop by the Town Clerk's office during business hours to get your ballot, or call Wendy to have her mail you one. As always, contact me if you want to talk more about any issue.

Greetings from your Volunteer Fire Department!

This spring & summer we have focused on completing some maintenance activities on the trucks including a full inspection from a KME representative in June with a review of our 2009 pumper truck. We are also planning to seal the driveway this summer following the pavement that was added last year.

We are continuing to research options for changing our band frequency due to the law change that goes into effect as of January 2013 which will require us to switch to a narrow band.

Keep an eye out for future hydrant locations & pass your ideas along as we often can obtain grant dollar to help installing new hydrant locations.
